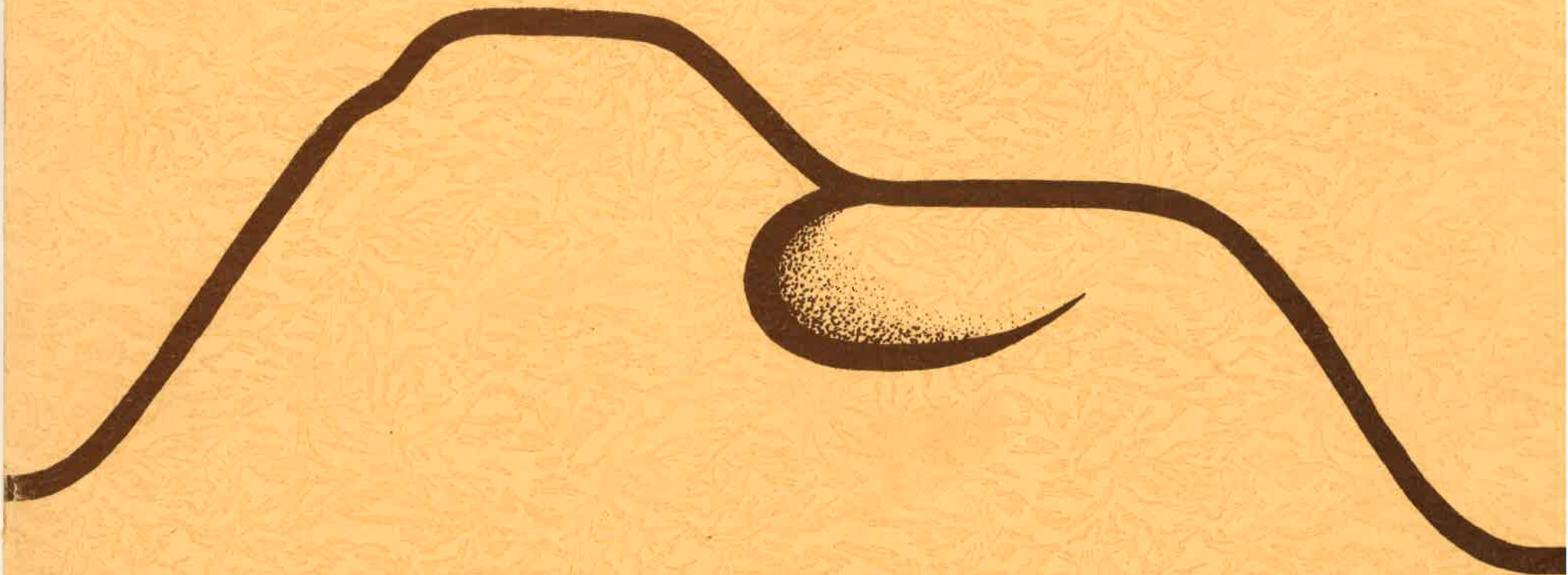

As Acting Principal for the short span of a College term, I am permitted to look a little backward as I write the Magazine's Foreword. There are but a few staff members who can look over their shoulders with me to the most distant by-gone days. I can name only Miss Erickson and Miss Longland who remember Mr Armstrong's foundation year custom of standing on the roadway outside the Staff Room and Room 14, bidding the then Third Formers 'goodbye' each afternoon, with a smile and a friendly eye. The same foundation Staff will certainly remember the booming voice and laugh of our first Guidance Counsellor — Mr Gerry Reid — whose concern for the well being of spirit of each pupil was deep and dedicated. He was a man who could tongue-lash a wrong doer with a vigour that counterbalanced an almost tender regard for the same wrong doer's inner self. Still glancing over my shoulder I catch a glimpse of the tall and dignified Mr Rau Kirikiri — the only Maori member of the staff of the 'first year' — through whom many of the foundation year made their first real contact with Maoritanga. Mr Kirikiri could instantly command the respect and affection of young Pakeha and Maori alike. It was he who set the Maori Culture Club on its way and handed it over in an active and vigorous state to Mr Green (and later) Mrs Green, under whose control it has flourished to command its present leading position among Auckland Secondary Schools.

A great number of us can look back to the day that the College was joined by Mrs Faafua Laban: indeed our first School Certificate Candidates had received their result cards before Mrs Laban first wrote on a Mangere College blackboard. That was February 1974. Mrs Laban formed a Samoan Culture Group and thus extended the Polynesian culture strength of the College. In but three years Mrs Laban brought the Samoan Culture Club to a standard that paralleled the Maori Cultural Club, so that together they won the First Annual Polynesian Festival Competition in 1976, and repeated that success again in 1977, against wider competition.

These successes certainly did not go unnoticed by Mr Harry Dansey, who in a recent newspaper report, named Mangere College as one of the leading Secondary Schools in the field of race harmony. A newspaper reporter rang the College the day following to ask how we established such a reputation of racial goodwill. There is no answer that could be given to the Press. The simple answer is that Mangere College is a community of **good human relationships** — of which its ethnic harmony is but an extension. To account for these **good human relationships** in detail would be difficult, but important in that accounting would be the early influences of Mr Armstrong, Mr Reid, Mr Kirikiri and the later influences of Mr and Mrs Green and Mrs Laban, and the dedicated people who have assisted them.

Good human relationships are self-perpetrating!

FREEDOM

We set out with ten boats each carrying approximately 75 people. As each day went by the numbers of boats decreased but the refugees increased on each boat. Many lives were lost, many were small children. However we had to continue so our enemies would not find us. Day and night we sailed, hoping we would be as far away as possible, but sometimes at night in the silence we can hear gun shots in the distance. Knowing one of our boats is being attacked all we can do is hope that we would escape the enemies.

Food was running low and many were suffering from seasickness. Before long odour spread on the boat. Never once did anyone complain about the sickness or the odour. We were so closely associated and caring so much of each other that nothing seemed to disrupt our relationships.

Each person knows that we are all one, your happiness is my happiness, your pain is my pain. We must have been sailing for two weeks before we saw land. We were so happy that we nearly suffocated with joy. We had made it we had escaped from our enemies; we were free!

The patrol boats escorted us to an area where all the refugees were and later we were taken into a dense forest. Later this was our home. There must have been one hundred thousand refugees living there, everyone was from South Vietnam. Everyone was helping to build tents and huts for everyone. There seemed to be no selfishness in anyone.

At first the food that the Government gave us was steak and fish, but as time went by we found that the meals were all smelly and off, but we still ate to keep us alive, later on it seemed they would only give us rotten food. Every meal was the same rotten fish, sometimes I would see maggots in my fish soup. We dared not complain; instead we would smile as the food was offered to us.

One of the top rank visited us to see what the situation was. He was a very wise looking and rational man. He walked up to me and asked me how I was enjoying the steak. I replied it is succulent and tender. Thank your government very much for such hospitality.
