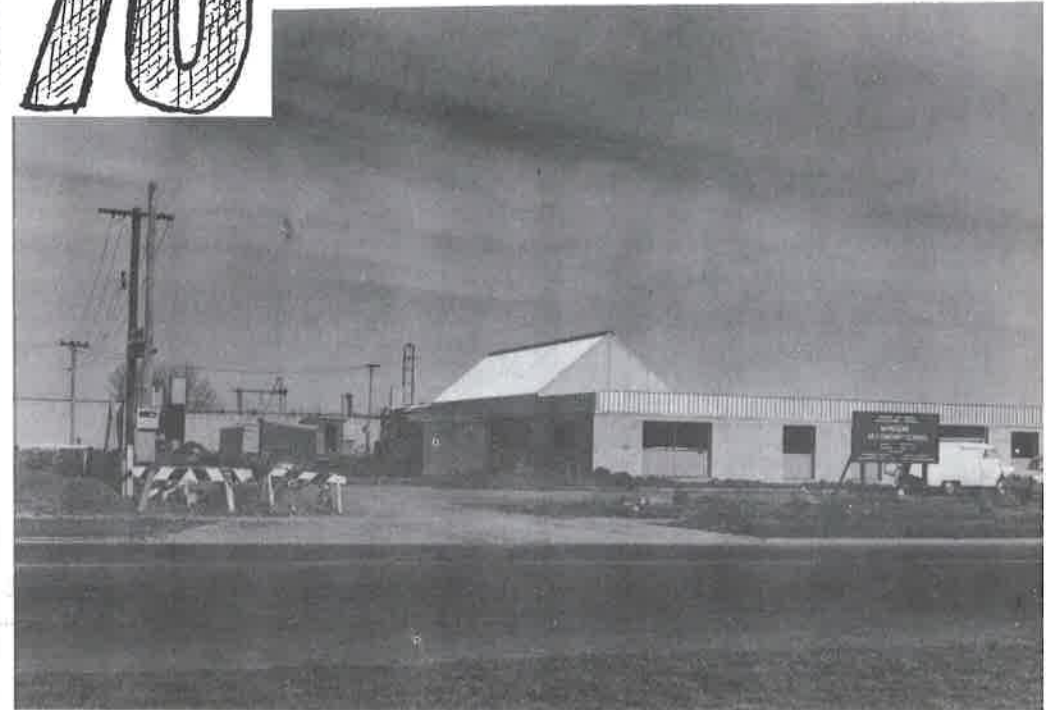
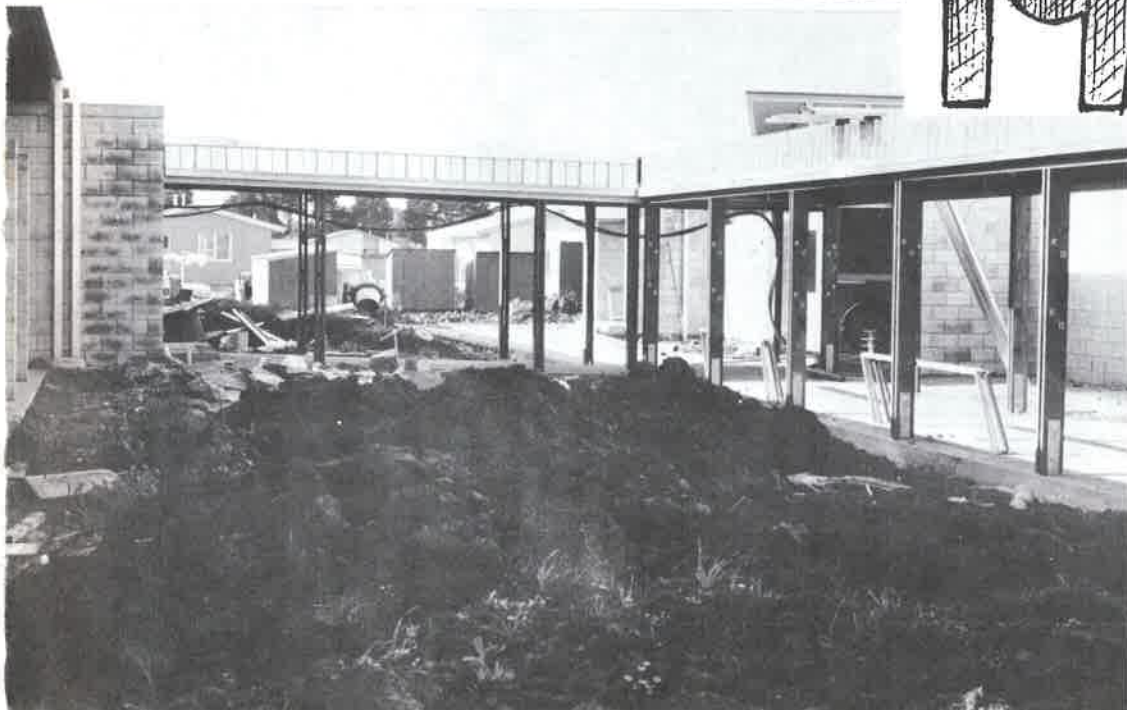
I could go on for there have been many moments of satisfaction - our achievements in cultural competitions and promotion, in sports. in community development and student welfare - but space does not permit.

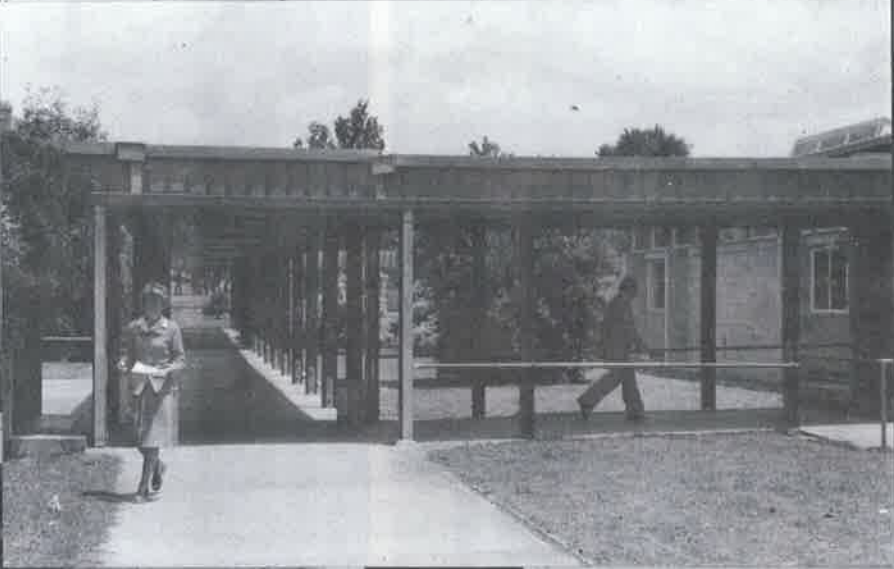

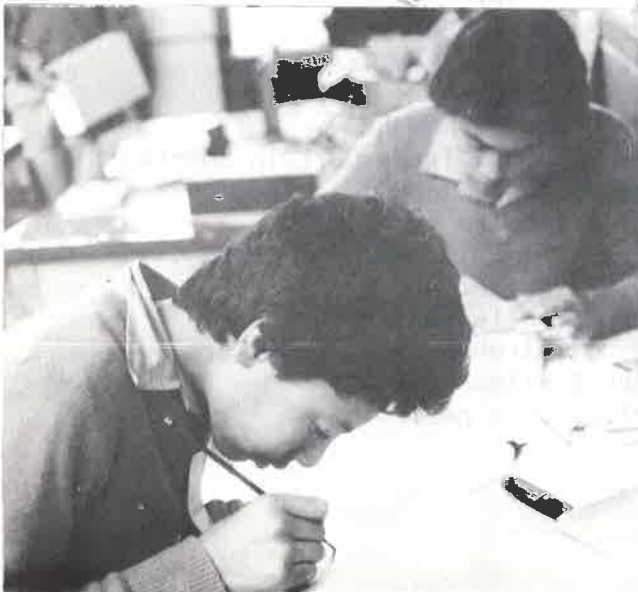
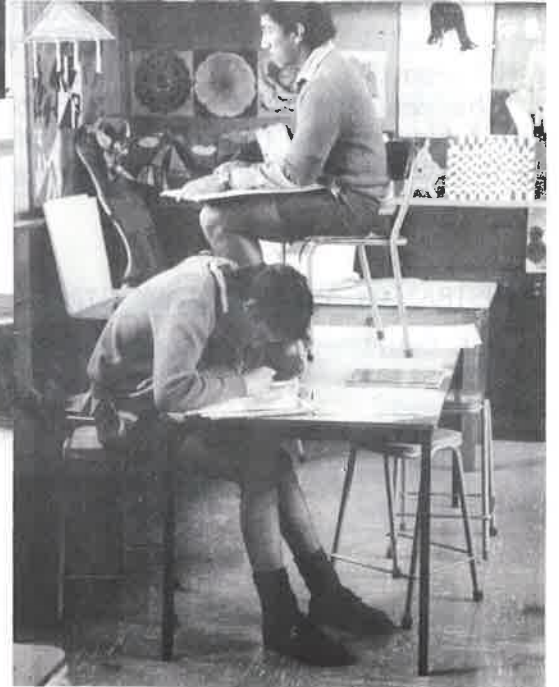

Competitions commenced with swimming and the First win Fell to Kawau with strict discipline and applause for the losers. ## 1ST XI BOYS HOCKEY

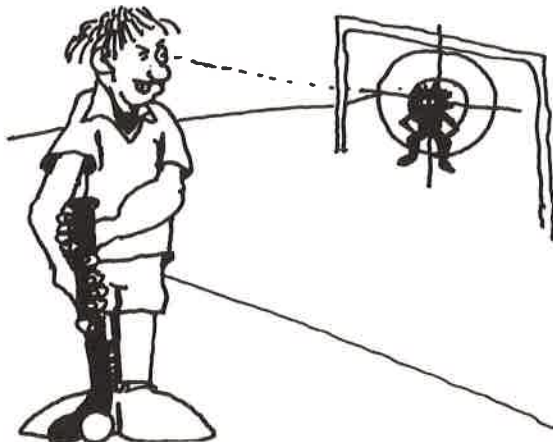
The 1st XI had a very successful season and finished 2nd equal in the Auckland Secondary School under 16 A Grade competition.

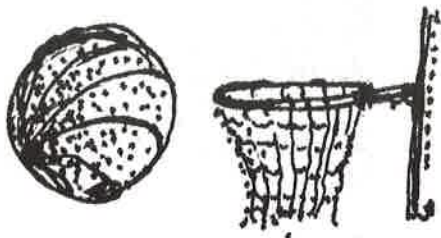

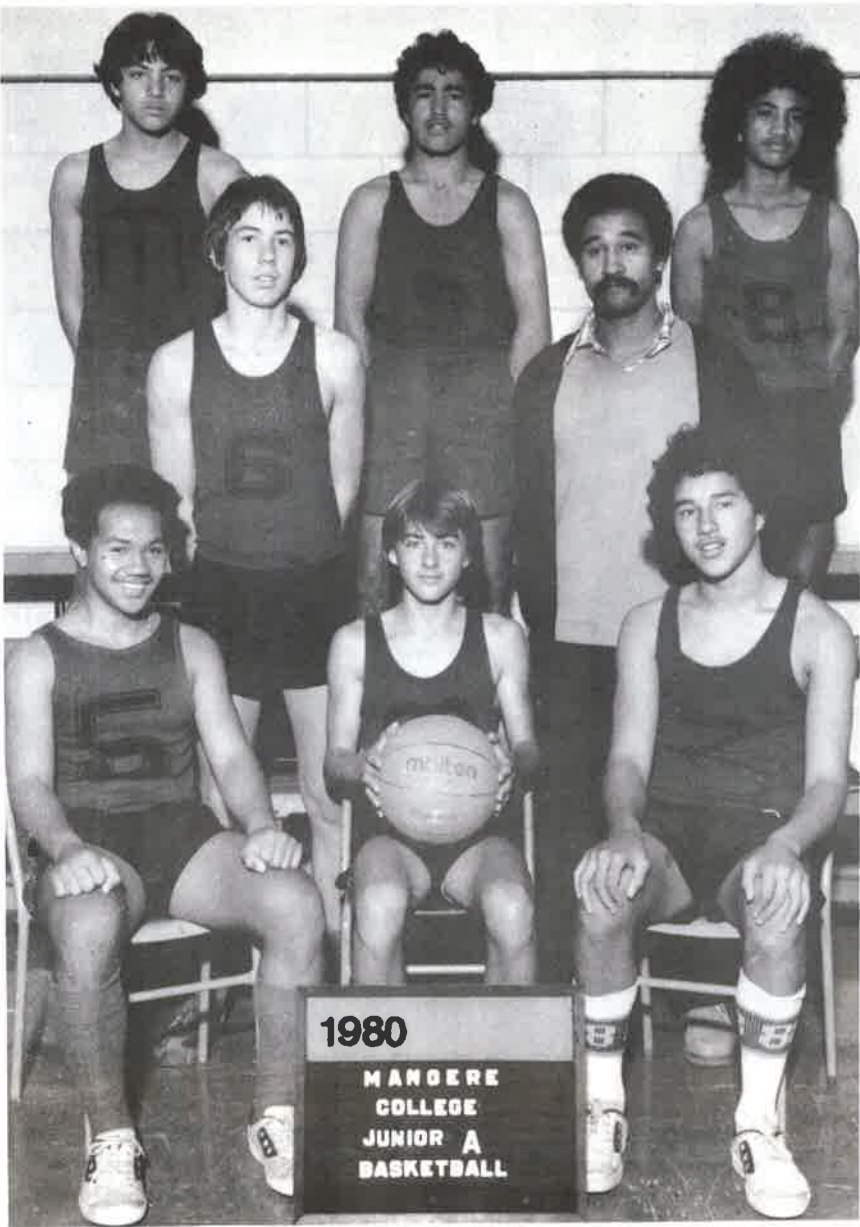
### THE INSIDE WORD

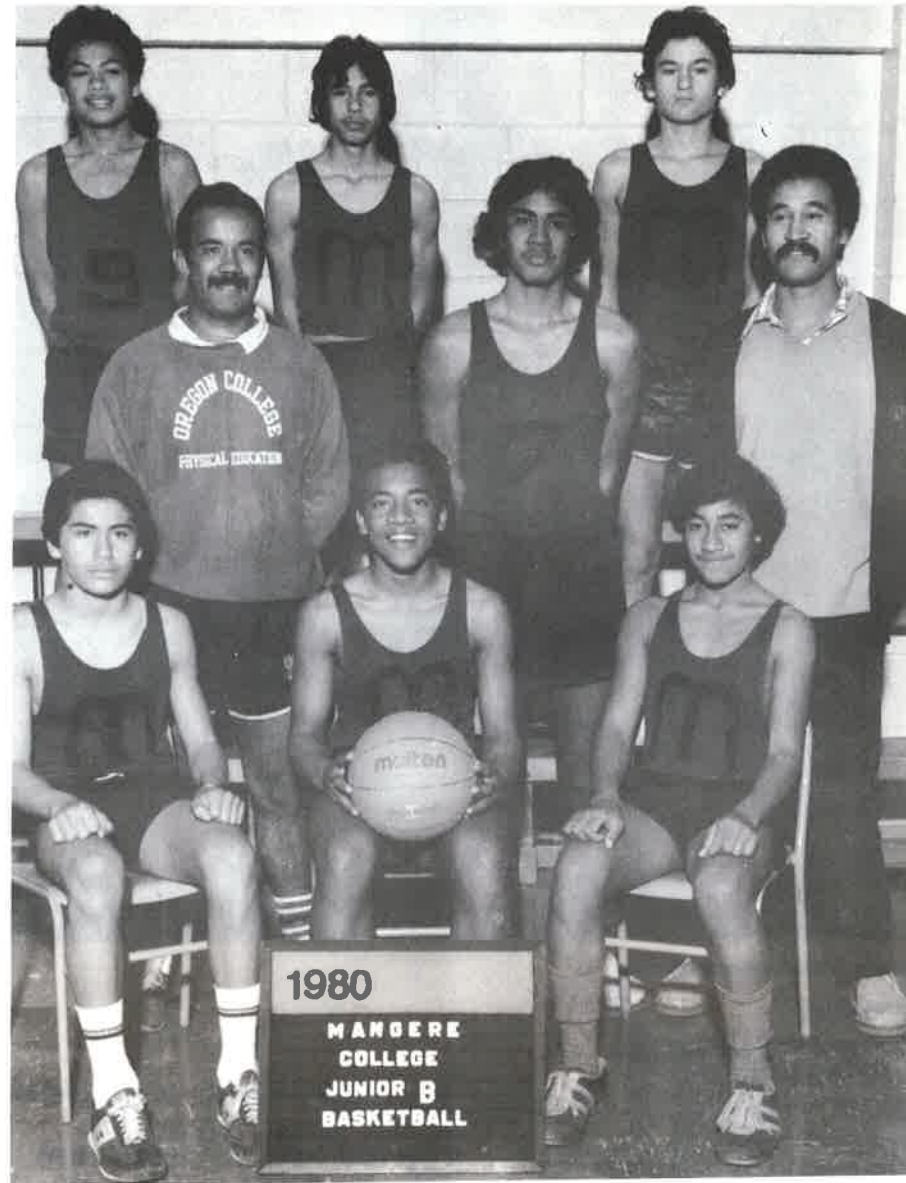

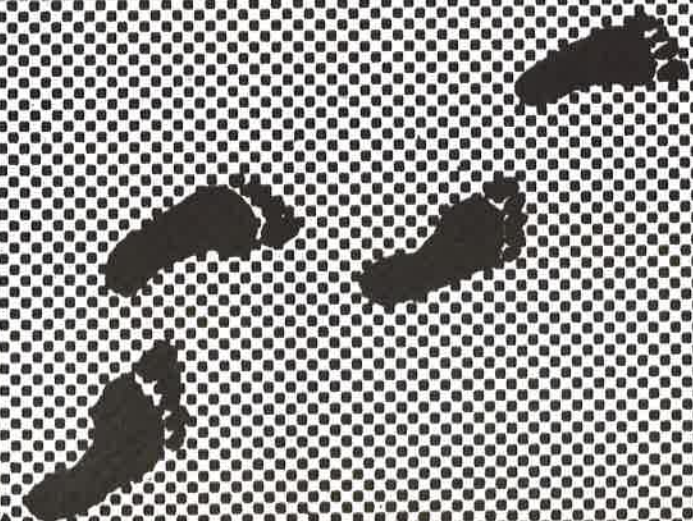
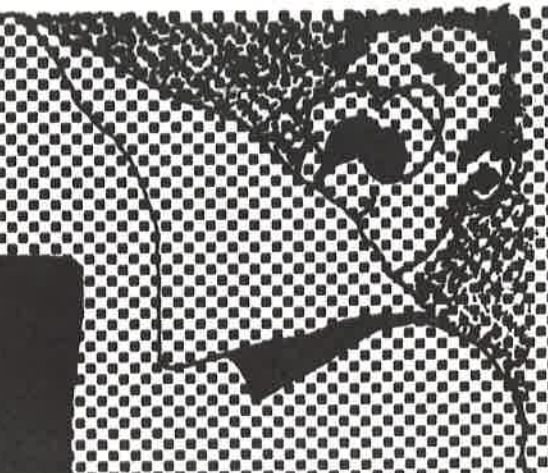

In preparation for the Festival, the Group had two live-in weekends to polish their performance. These live-ins not only served as practices, but also helped bring the Club members closer together.

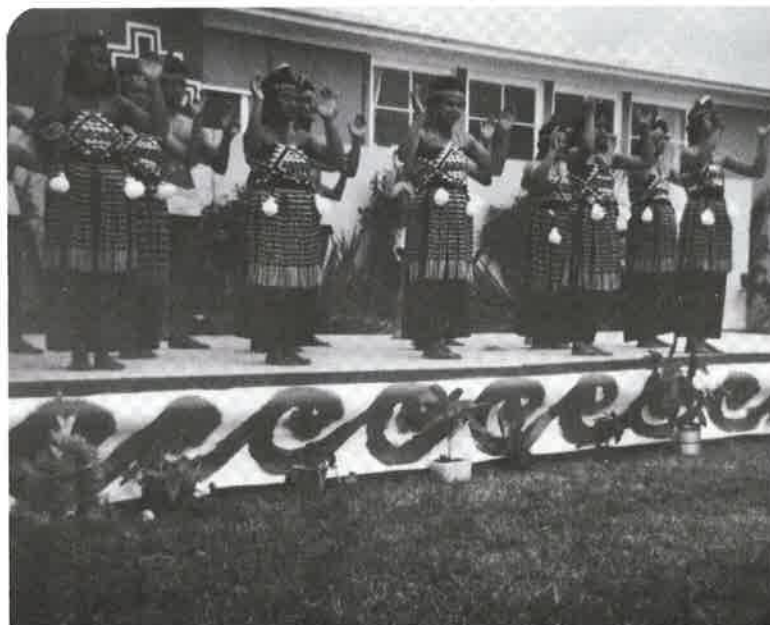

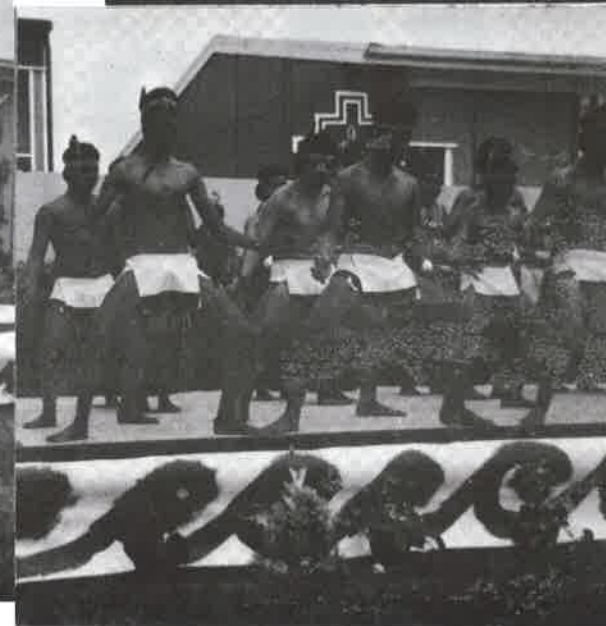

The seed of fame and fortune has now been planted in such far off places as Thames, with the commencement of our concert on 16th July this year. We were shown great hospitality there.

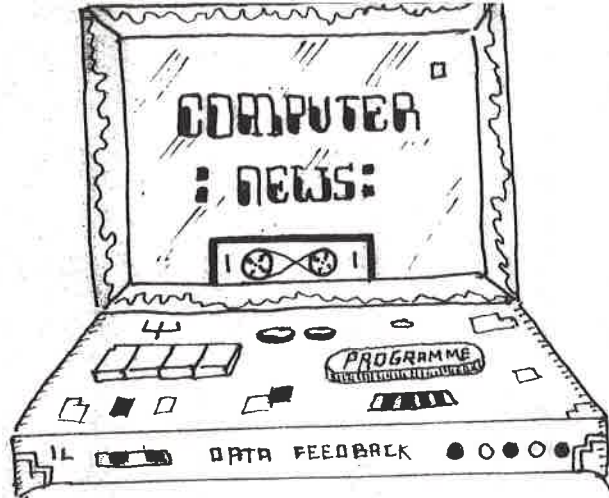
