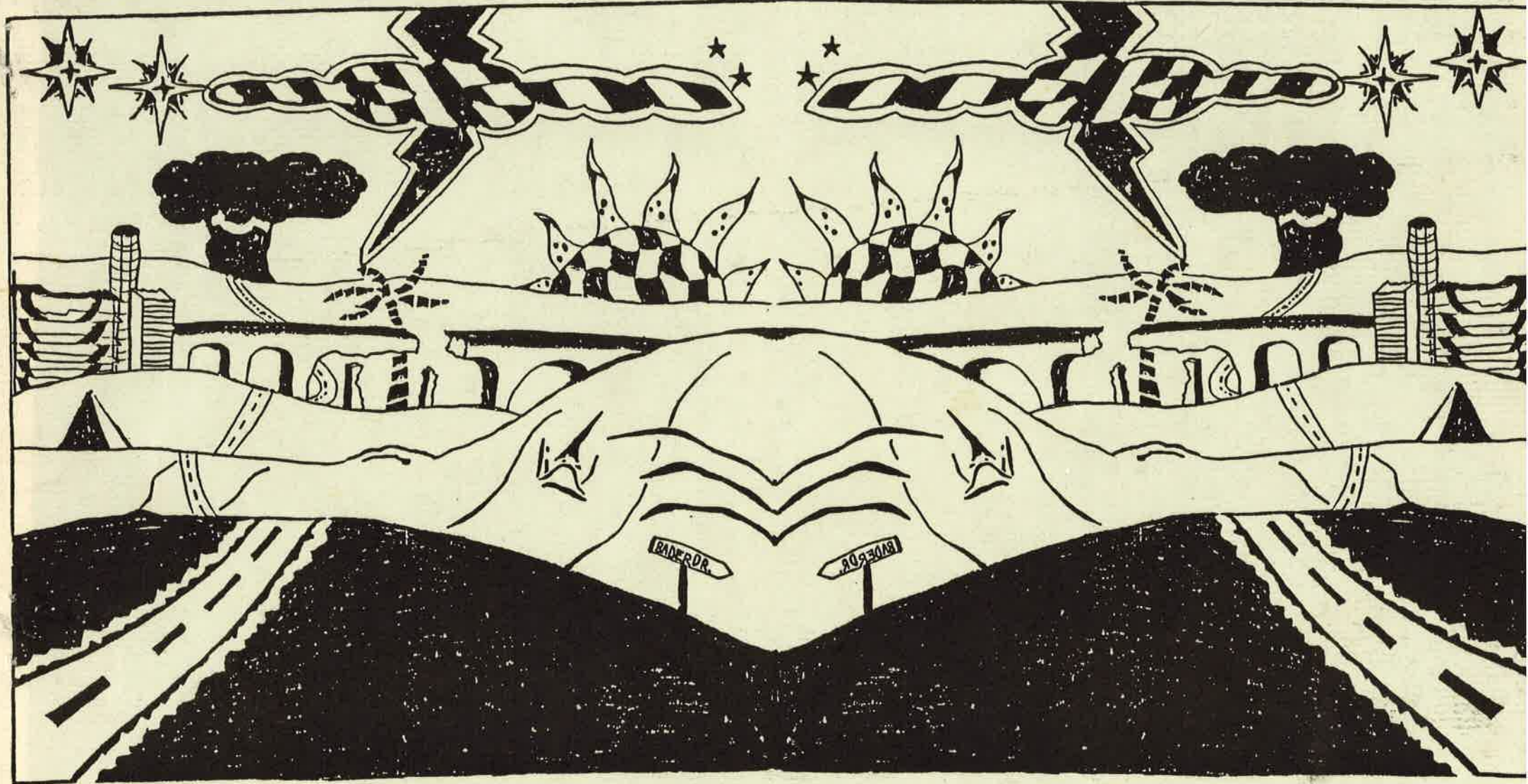

## FOREWORD

1986 has been a sound year for Mangere College with much good work done and significant advances made in the social development of our students. Our show, "Tin Pan Ali", maintained the tradition of excellence in musical production and our cultural groups performed with their usual distinction. Volleyball continues to be the dominant team game and this year our Junior Boys won and our Junior Girls were runners-up in the Auckland Championships. For the first time ever, the Bader Trophy was shared by two worthy recipients, Richard Goulstone and Trish Smith, and also for the first time, we saw the appearance of Workshop Technology as a School Certificate subject. If this practical subject can reach the level achieved by Art over recent years, it will be very worthwhile.

On the other hand, 1986 is the first year we have not had a number of students receiving University Entrance which, in my view, has greatly disadvantaged the students of this College and their families. But it is the first year when 98% of our candidates will pass School Certificate. Anyone who gets above 18% will be given a certificate saying that they have achieved adequately. Teachers know that this is rubbish, our students know that this is rubbish and employers know that this is

rubbish. It appears that the Department of Education is the only organisation which thinks otherwise and seems intent on reducing standards to the lowest common denominator. Sadly, it is the students of colleges such as ours who will suffer most in this incredible debacle, for students from the more affluent areas have family finance and influence to see them through.

And finally, 1986 will see the removal of two classrooms from Mangere College - a clear indication of the falling roll situation which now exists. From a high of 1250 students the college roll is expected to decline to about 800 students in a few years. This will not be detrimental to the school's progress just so long as the promise of adequate staffing is fulfilled.

In conclusion, I would like to express my satisfaction with the year's activities and wish you all a very enjoyable vacation.

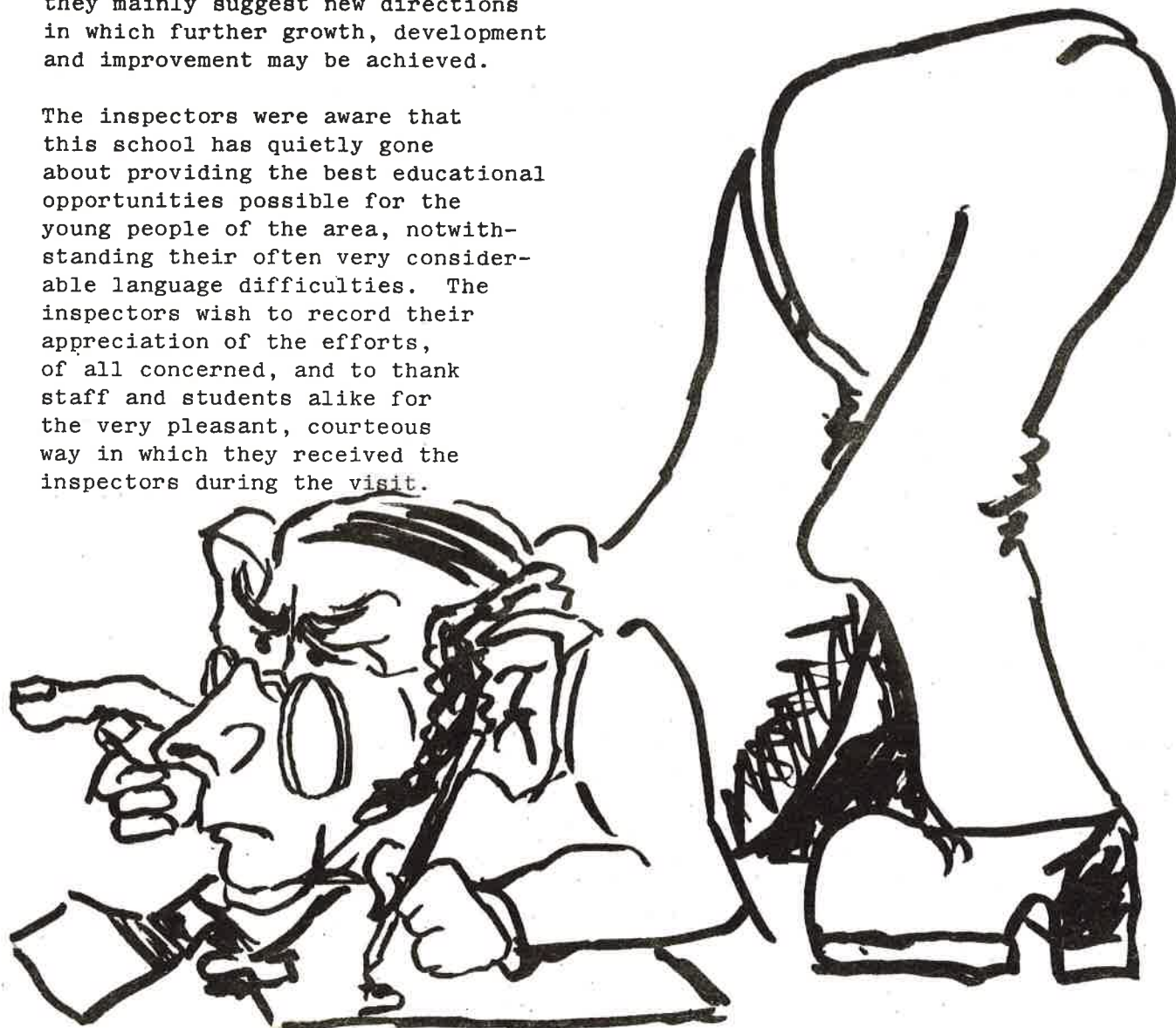
DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION  
INSPECTION REPORT ON MANGERE COLLEGE  
1986

Mangere College was last reported in 1982 and was described on that occasion as "by any standards of assessment, a successful school, led by able administrators, served by teachers who are dedicated, competent and skilled, and offering a generally high standard of education to its pupils".

In the intervening four years Mangere College has continued to develop as a fine school, offering often outstanding educational opportunities to its students. The inspectors could not help but be impressed with the way in which the school grounds and buildings are valued and respected. Students have a friendly manner, are courteous yet open, wear their uniform with pride, and have good, positive work habits. They have an easy grace in their dealings with adults that speaks highly of the respect in which they hold their teachers, and the fine teacher-student relationships that exist in the school. The school itself insists on high academic effort from its students, and is organised in a very structured way, yet with humanity and caring.

Almost all of the recommendations of the last report have been put into effect. As a result, although the specialist reports which follow do contain recommendations, they mainly suggest new directions in which further growth, development and improvement may be achieved.

The inspectors were aware that this school has quietly gone about providing the best educational opportunities possible for the young people of the area, notwithstanding their often very considerable language difficulties. The inspectors wish to record their appreciation of the efforts, of all concerned, and to thank staff and students alike for the very pleasant, courteous way in which they received the inspectors during the visit.

We hope they are enjoying their new school.

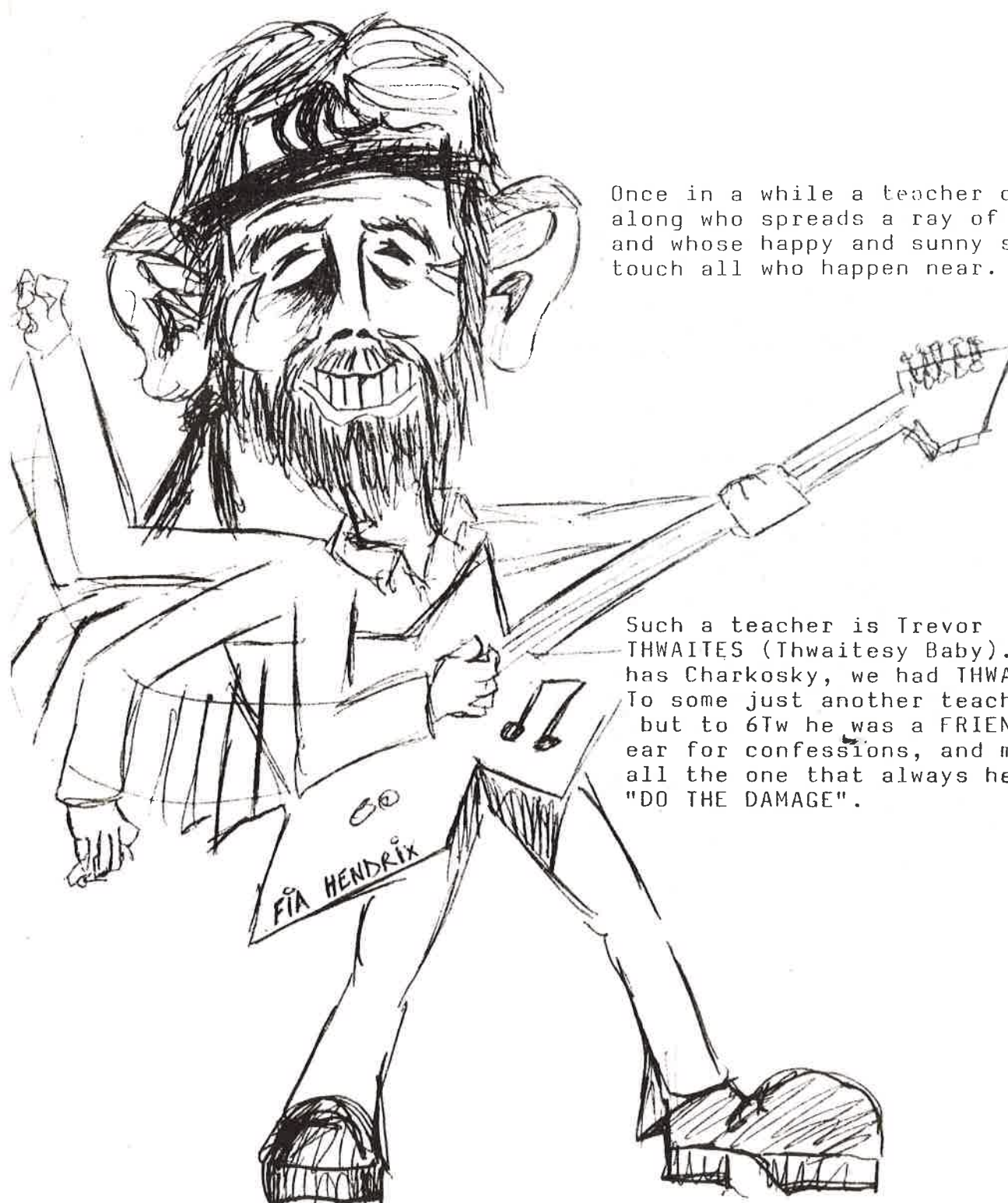

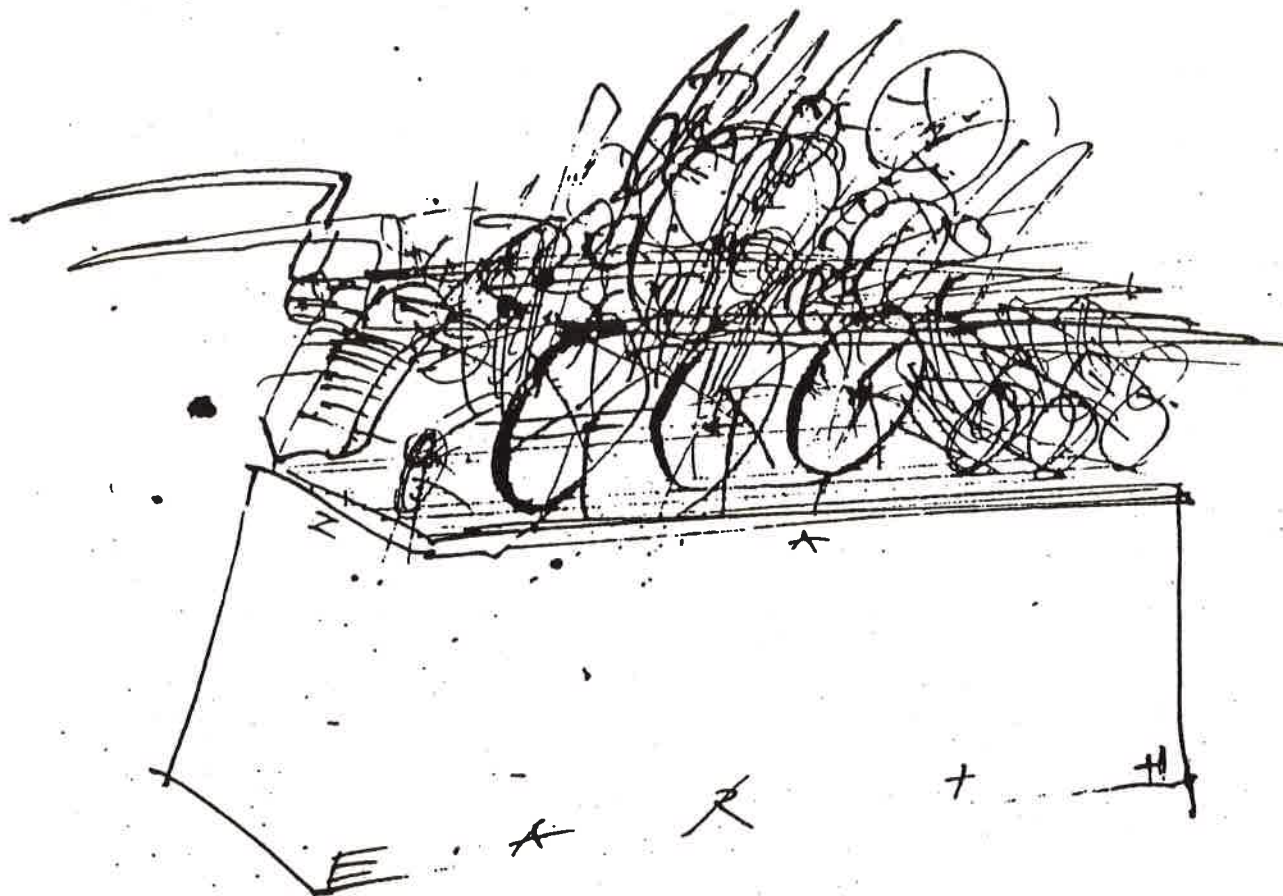

Lost vs Shirley, Christchurch 2, 6-15, 15-17, 11-15.

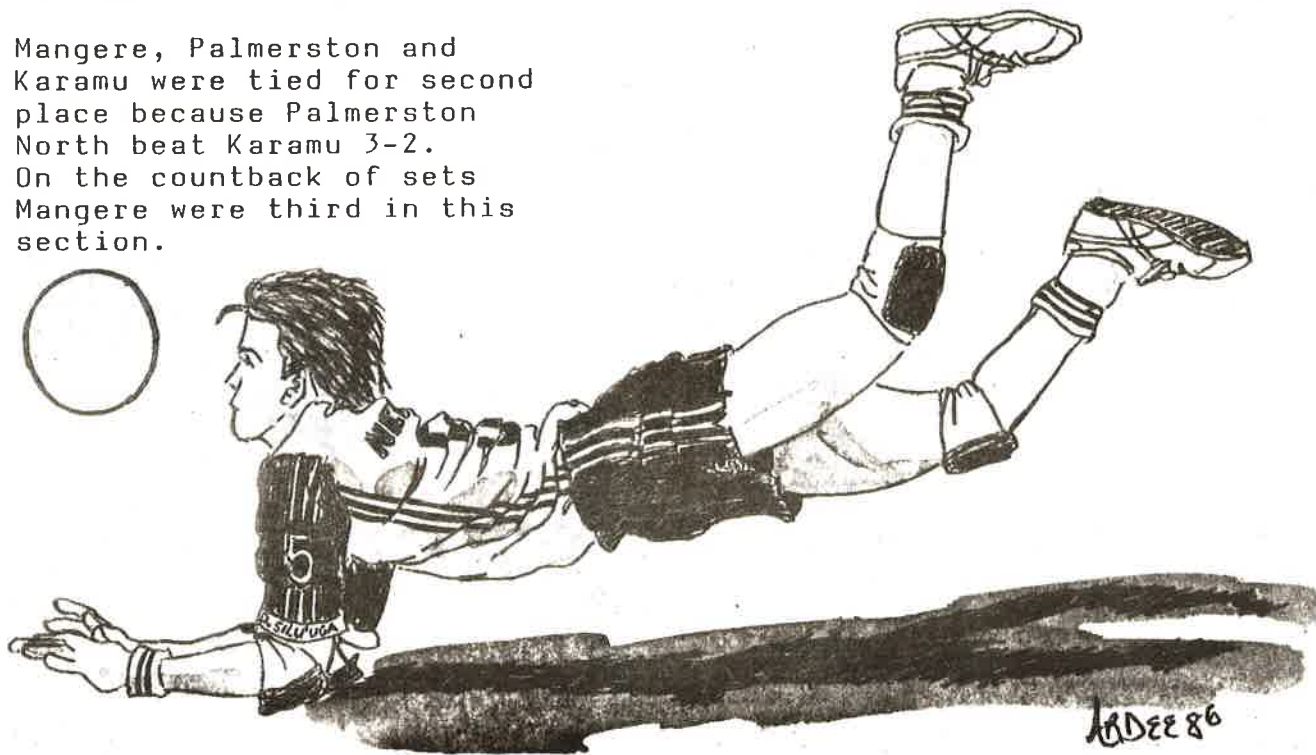
Mangere played Hawera High School for 13th and 14th placing. Mangere won 2-1.

About her, nothing stirs. Only the lights which race quickly over the curtains then vanish with the sound of passing cars.

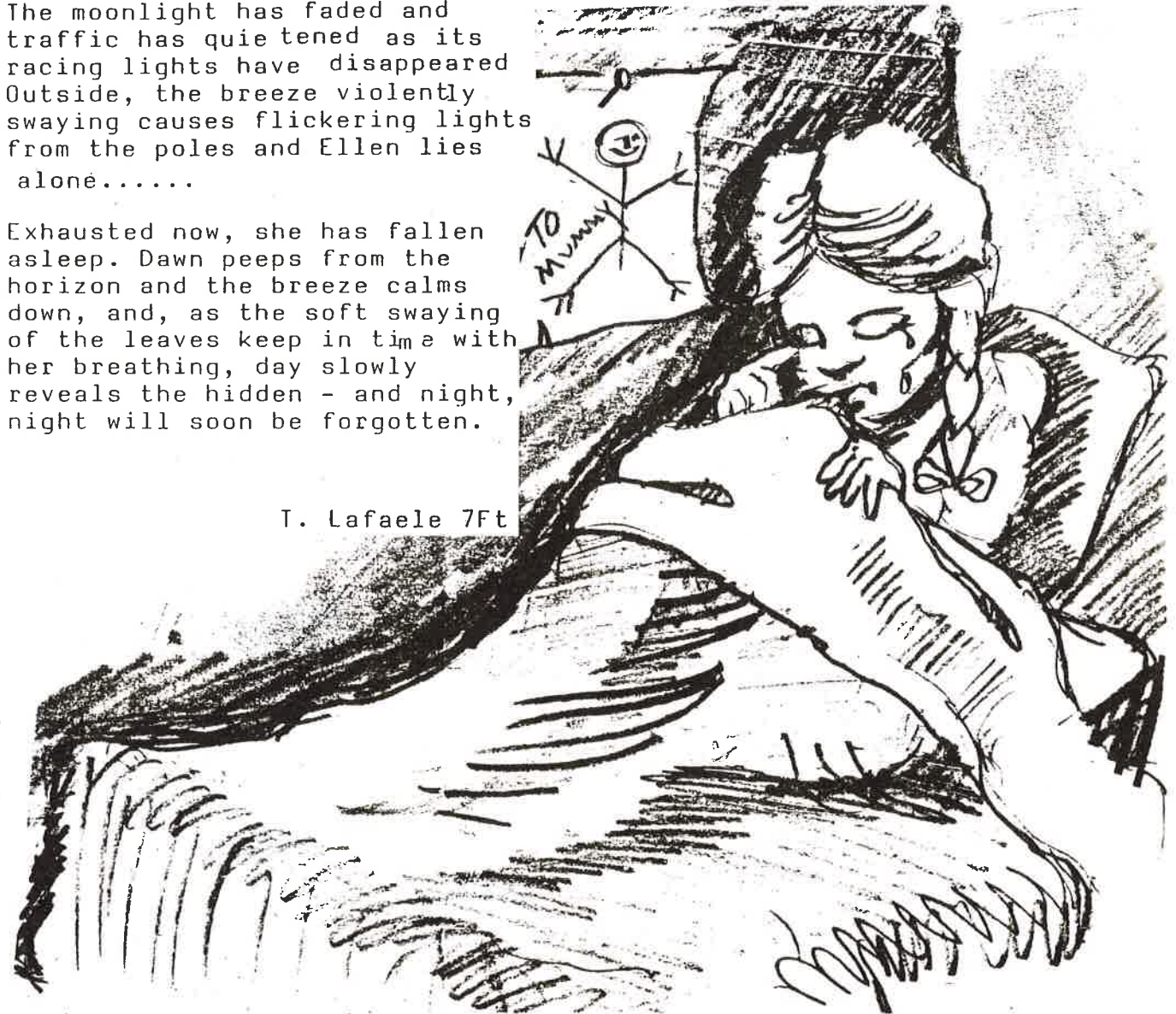

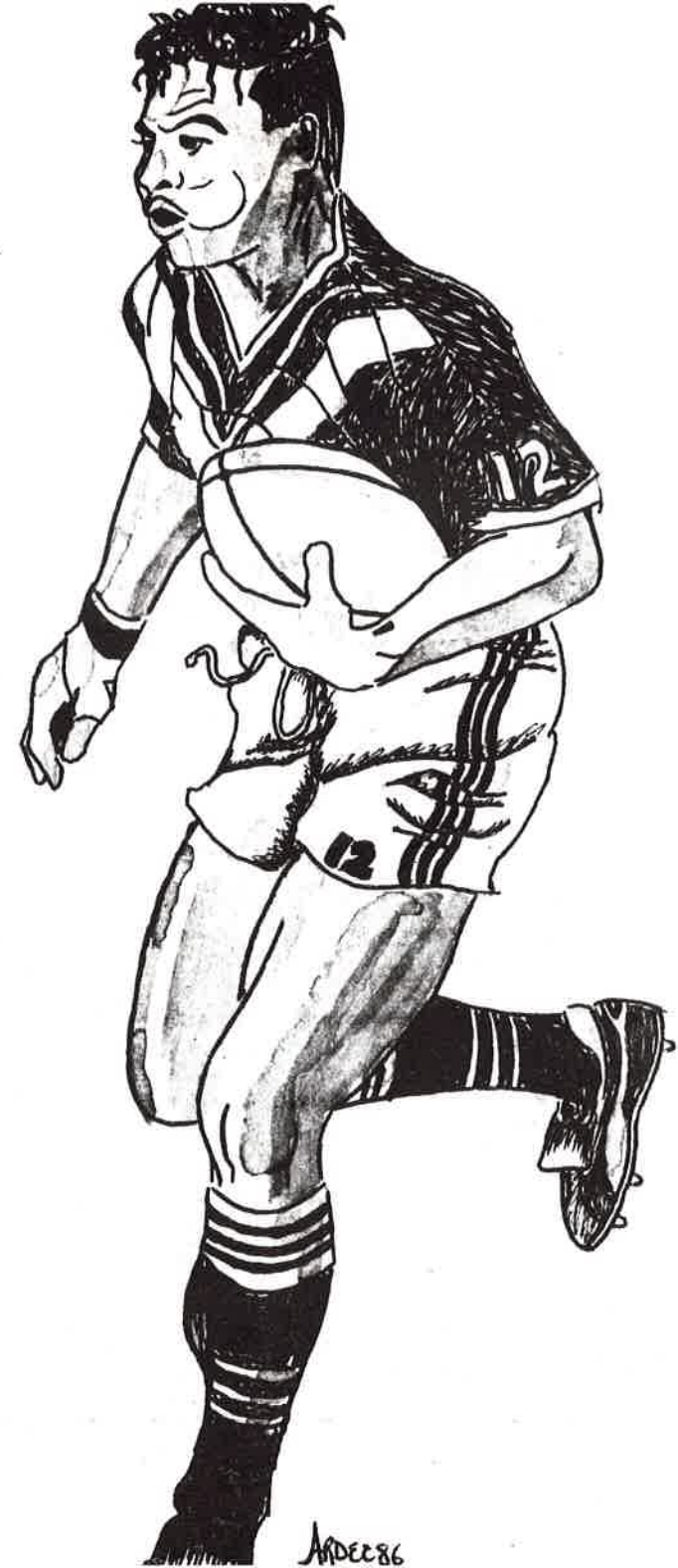
### U.57's

At this time also there was a lot of experimenting going on, such as using a fire extinguisher to create a dramatic effect. The show still went on.

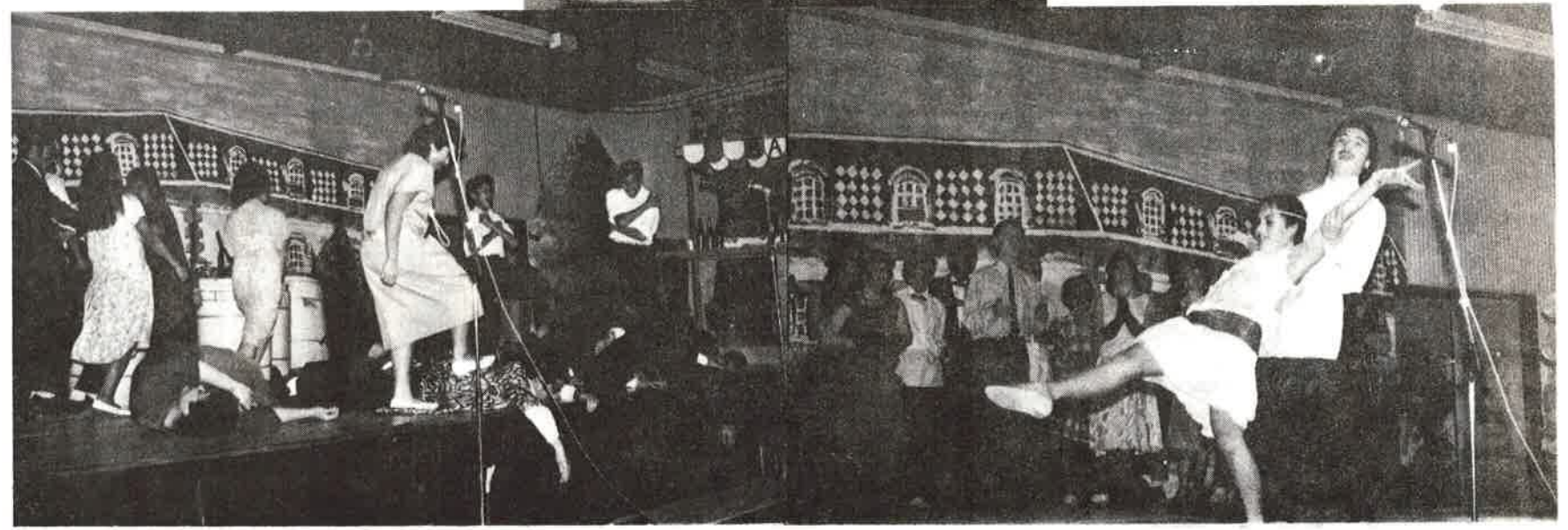
Saturday night was the big night. The auditorium was all but full. The audience again were ready to cheer for the actors and actresses. All on stage gave a 100 per cent effort.

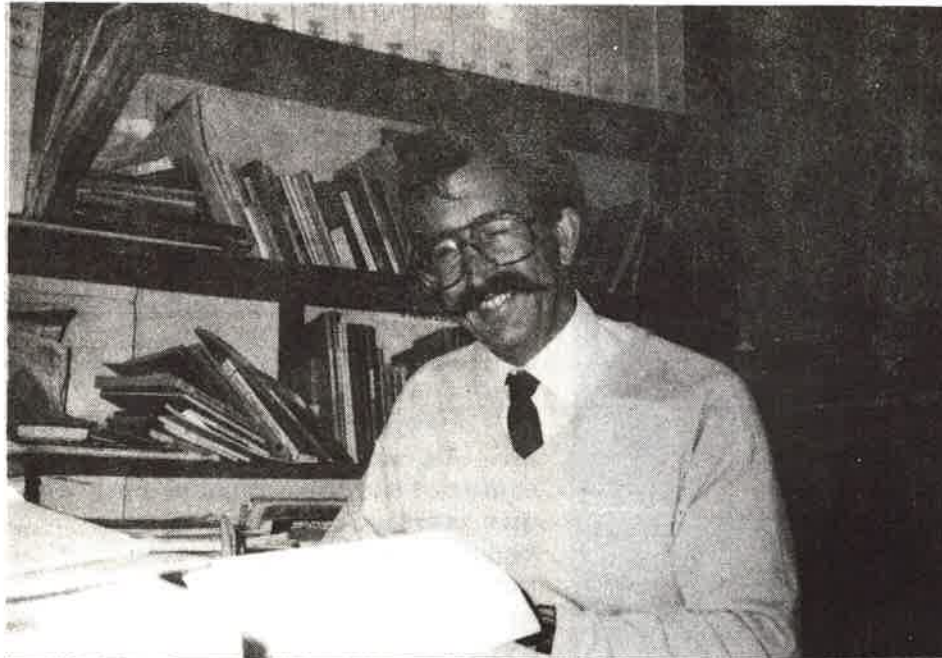

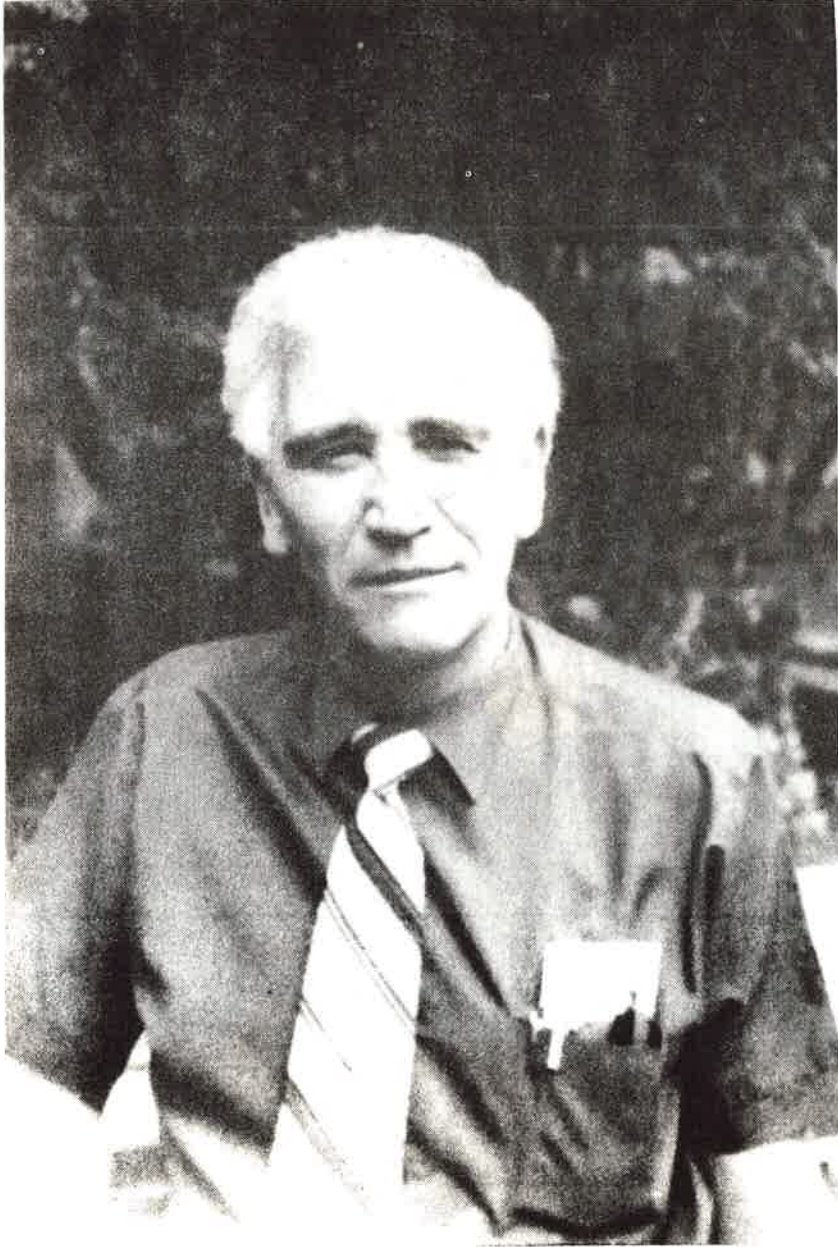

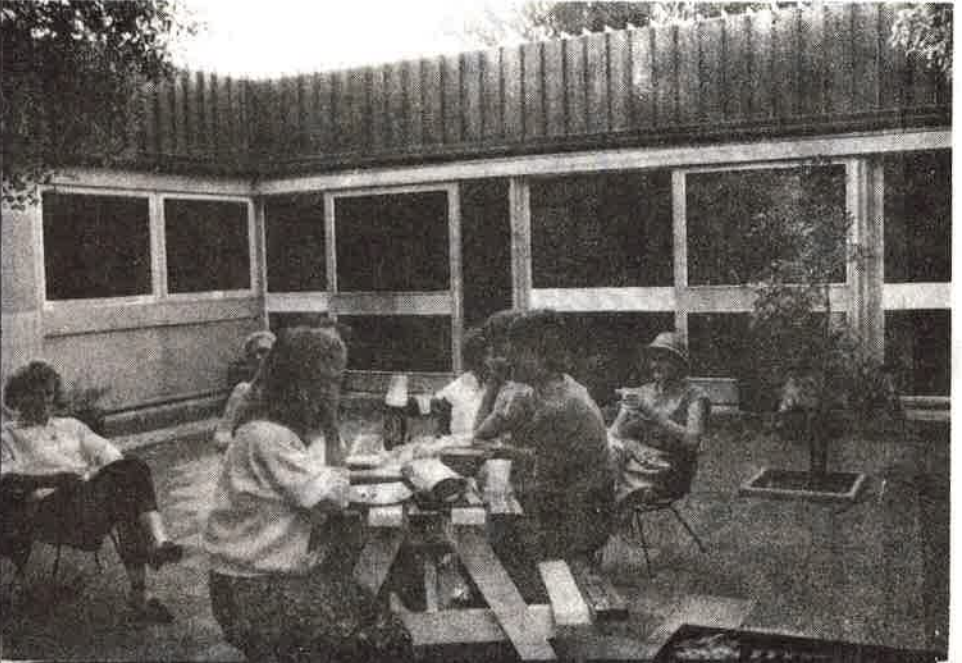
