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Principal's Report



Kia Ora, Talofa, Kia Orana, Fakalofa Lahi Atu, Malo E Lelei, Greetings to one and All.

1990 saw a very good start to the school year, with the Commonwealth Games coupled with the Sesquicentenial Celebrations helping people to focus on all the positive things that we can be so thankful for in this country. There was tremendous goodwill between people and it is timely to reflect how ones attitude and outlook makes such a difference even in difficult times.

Unlike 1989, the paper war was much reduced but the challenges and demands laid down for the Board of Trustees and Administrative Staff have kept us more than busy this year. I am pleased to say that much of what is required of us under Tomorrow's Schools has been set in place already, and in the years ahead, we will refine and evolve our policies to help deliver better support for teachers and students in this College.

Last year the only certainties we had were more uncertainties. Tomorrow's Schools was about revising the Administration of schools with a long term effect, hopefully, of better educated students. I believe that

now a lot of this is all in place and the fuss is dying down, teachers will be very keen to get on with improving the educational outcomes in the classroom.

Traditional unskilled jobs are disappearing. Being a good reliable labourer isn't enough if there are no such jobs fitting these qualities. We must learn how to motivate and discipline ourselves to stick to our studies until we have mastered them well. The wealth of a country lies in its people. Many of you will be doing jobs in the future unheard of today. To meet the challenge we have to get you to the highest standard possible so you can start on a level playing field with the other students in New Zealand. If you want a better future you've got to help build it by making a total commitment to school while you are here

A personal thanks to all the staff in the school, both teaching and ancillary. Your efforts are much appreciated and collectively they make Mangere College a fine place to educate our young people.

Thanks also go to Monita, Peter, and William who have played an important part in the students' life this year. We wish you every success in your future endeavours. I am indebted to Mr Hodge, staff trustee, (who is on leave to teach in England in 1991) for his support and also every trustee for supporting the programmes and philosophy of the school.

For those of you who are leaving us, thank you for what you have brought to this school, and for what you have made of it in your time with us. You are a special group of people and many of you leave behind tremendously positive examples for all to follow.

Good Luck for the future! Thank you for being who you are and what you are.

The Board of Trustees was elected in May 1989 and legally took responsibility for running the school from the 1st of October 1989.

In 1990, the Board completed the development of the charter. A full day meeting was held to write up the local components. The final document was after consultation with the community and staff, submitted to the Government, approved and has been signed. It is now the responsibility of the Board to ensure that the requirements of the charter are met.

The Administration and financial affairs of the college have been established on an up to date fully professional basis. A complete record of all financial transactions are presented for Board security every

month. A fully audited set of accounts was presented at the Annual General Meeting.

The Board is endebted to Mrs Anita Taylor for her work in this area. The Board is now able to turn its attention to ensure that all present facilities are well maintained and developed and up dated to meet the needs of the students.

1990 has also been a year in which the Board of Trustees has undergone its own educational programme to ensure that all members have the knowledge to deal effectively and efficiently with the running of a million dollar plus educational institute. Expertise has been gained through seminars, professional courses and guest speakers on topics such as financial management, grievance and disciplining procedures, Equal Employment Opportunities and Government/ Management Principles.

The Board of Trustees met on the second Wednesday of every month from 4.30 to 7.30. Although vigorous debate often took place an extremely co-operative and constructive mood was always in evidence.

Bilingual Unit

The whanau o te reo was established this year with a third form class made up of students from Bader Intermediate's bilingual class and other students who expressed an interest in joining the whanau.

The goal of the whanau is to educate students in the context of Maori language and culture, as well as to develop skills needed for life in the wider society.

The basic criteria for entry into the whanau are:

- a) That students want to participate in the whanau;
- b) That parents support the student's choice;
- c) That the students continue to support the Kaupapa through to the 7th form;
- d) That students aspire to achieve sound academic standards.

There are about 28 3rd formers in the whanau. These students will continue participation at the 4th form level. The core subjects for the whanau will include Maori which means that they will be doing an additional subject next year.

- 1) Polynesian Cultural Festival at Rutherford High School.
- 2) Nga Manu Korero 1990 Tamaki Makaurau at

Nga Tapuwae College (Speech Competitions). The two representatives from the whanau were Keri Pewhairangi - 3rd place in the Sir Turi Carroll Junior English section and Esther King highly commended but not placed in the Rawhiti Ihaka Trophy section.

- 3) Visit to Ngaruawahia to participate in the Maori Cultural Competitions for the Coronation Festival.
- 4) Weekend hui at Ihumatao Marae, Mangere.
- 5) Visit to M.O.T.A.T.
- 6) Visit to the University's Open Day.
- 7) End of the Year trip to Rotorua.

In 1991, we look forward to welcoming new members of the whanau to the 3rd form level. One of the pre-requisites of a successful whanau is that there be good quality teaching, an interesting and enjoyable programme and that there are strong expectations of success by all those involved.

Yes Corporation Report



The company was formed at the beginning of March and we came up with five product ideas. We then divided ourselves into five groups and each group did market research on its product and bought back the results to the company.

After much deliberation we decided on personalized monogrammed towels. We then decided on a price that was affordable for the local community. Our market research indicated that the cost of a good quality towel should be between \$20 and \$25.

ACHIEVEMENT

YES Corporation's first business objective as stated in our statement of purpose was to make a profit. In 1990 I am pleased to announce a profit of \$143.94.

We achieved this profit by selling towels to friends and families and setting up stalls at the local community markets, where we sold only 20 towels due to tough competition.

We also had a Fathers' Day special gift that didn't do as well as we planned, but we managed to sell off all the remaining stock.

Y.E.S Corporation's objective was a return of 20% on shareholders' funds.

In 1990 I am pleased to announce the return is 16% .

Our third objective was to sell 100 towels. Sales exceeded our target and 154 towels were sold. The Corporation's fourth objective was for each director to sell a minimum of 10 towels each. Unfortunately, not all directors met this objective.

Last but not least, our objective was to gain valuable experience of how a company operates. Each member of YES Corporation has gained first hand knowledge of how a business operates. The idea was not only to sell the product, but more imporant, it was to gain experience and promote the Young Enterprise Scheme to students, teachers and parents, informing them of the opportunity available, in order to keep the scheme running in future years.

There were some problems with the handling of money, keeping of records, and loss of stock, but there were resolved as the year went on.

Thanks to everyone who helped , especially Suzanne Nolan, Helen Talafua and Mrs Anita Taylor. Overall the company was a success , especially as this was the first time . The scheme gave a lot of experience to the students , staff and advisors involved.

Mangere College's first Journalism class has survived the year. It was touch and go for awhile, especially during the later stages of the magazine.





wait for Mr and Mrs Blake who were constantly late. This became a habit of theirs during the week.




Besides getting bruises and getting stuck in trees all of the students enjoyed themselves. It was the best weekend of the year and they didn't wan't to come back home.





Good ball skills and more practice were needed as shown by the results of our first game but a lot of effort and determination were shown by these girls.






It's their last night, which is the night of their final rounds of 'scabbing'. After that everything is packed for their flight tomorrow morning.

The phone rang. God I hate Christmas.


