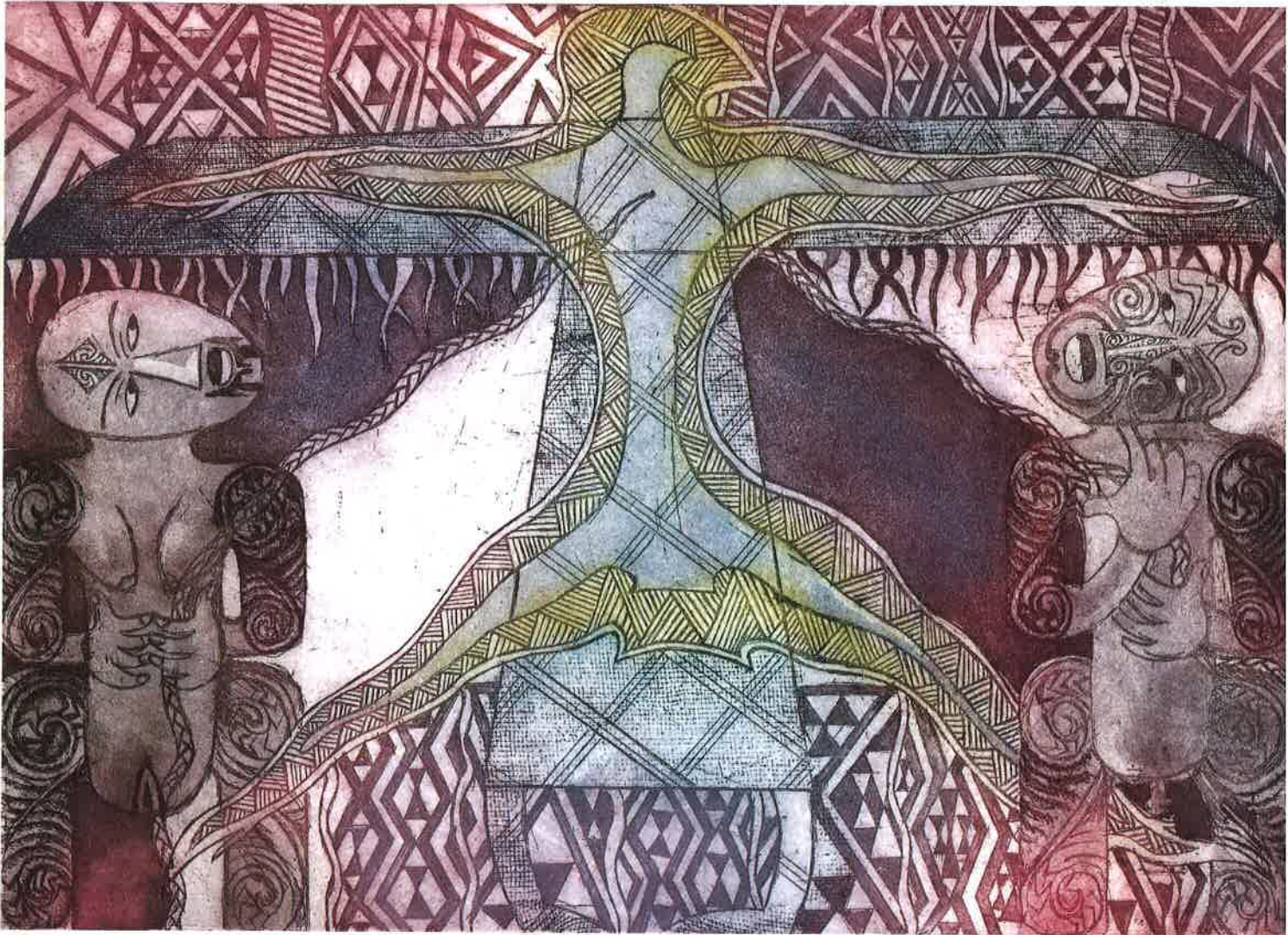

## Chairperson's Report

For the Mangere College Board of Trustees, 1991 has been an important year to consolidate and define a clear direction in which to head. With a forward plan for buildings, financial management and the commencement of policies and procedures well in hand we can now turn to the most important task, which is quality education for our children.

Hence the main areas from two of his key tasks, are professional development of staff, review of the timetable to meet student needs and assessment procedures.

Once areas of specific need have been identified for our children then the challenge for us as a College is to meet these needs within their learning environment. This can not be achieved without the physical and spiritual support of parents

coupled with that of our dedicated professional staff.

Of course our children have also participated in sports and cultural events. Appreciation is expressed to staff and parents who have supported Mangere College's presence at these events.

A special acknowledgement goes to Manukau Rovers and the Auckland Rugby Union for their sponsorship.

The annual secondary Schools Cultural Festival saw our school receive several 'highly commended' awards. A group of Maori students from Mangere College performed with much enthusiasm and pride at the Maori Queen's Coronation Celebration. Crew 42 and the Rock Quest, where our students were highly commended were performances that we can be very proud of. The Board recognizes the energy and sheer hard work that has gone into reaching these standards.

Overall Mangere College has fared well despite the many changes from the Government's new administration policies.

We look forward to 1992.

# New Learning Centre

The title L.A.C. can stand for any or all of three things, Learning Assistance Centre, Learning Acceleration Centre or Language Across the Curriculum.

A group of three rooms has been purpose-built this year to further help pupils with their learning.

There is the 'big' classroom, D4, used like the usual teaching space, but with the difference that there is a 'one-way' window at the back. Through this the D4 teacher can look into the smaller room, D5, and observe other small groups of students. This ranges from helping pupils who have just arrived in New Zealand and have no English, to pupils who want some 'acceleration' in their learning.

The third room is a special teacher preparation room where teachers can work developing suitable materials to help pupils.

The rooms are 'reading saturated' with all sorts of materials on the walls which capture the various interests of many pupils. The Material is also multicultural for the pupils of many different ethnic groups to identify with and feel 'at home' with.

Each day during SSR the LAC rooms are filled with a happy group of peer tutors and their pupils learning with each other. Every morning interval and lunchtime, too, D4 and D5 are full of pupils industriously working. "Choice" is the pupils' verdict of the new set-up.

Have you ever wanted to get out of a rut, change your lifestyle, try something new? I'm sure most people go through a phase when they'd like to swap lives with someone else but it's rarely possible. So I must admit I've been very fortunate this year as that is exactly what I've done. The League for the Exchange of Commonwealth Teachers is an organisation which promotes "life-swapping" by matching up teachers with similar qualifications in different countries. So it was that, with the help of the League, I flew to Auckland, took up residence in Mr. Hodge's house and came to teach in his classroom at Mangere College.

My first impression of the country was very visual. I was instantly aware of a huge sky and almost praeternaturally bright primary colours. Auckland has a toy town glow about it with its pretty wooden houses, wide streets, quaint cars and carefully tended gardens. And after torrential rain there is always the promise of a perfect rainbow arching over Mangere Bridge.

I did not get a chance to feel homesick in those first few weeks as Mrs Potter and Ms Campbell treated me like family. Having found my feet, lost my legs and been appointed an "honorary kiwi" by Mr Mckenty, I soon discovered what "hard case" and "dag" meant, learned how (not) to cook a pukeko and gave up counting possum road victims (after 193). In fact I have not felt homesick at all and it's hard to say what I miss about England except perhaps the Sunday papers and the pubs. It will be equally little things that I'll be

sorry to leave behind in Mangere Bridge-the three minute drive to school, picking a lemon off my own tree and the spiritual protection of One-Tree Hill (even if it does look like an Ostrich from Mr Hodge's house).

By juggling my credit cards I have truly indulged myself with holidays this year - easy to justify when you may only once be on the other side of the world. Highlights of my travels were whale-watching in Kaikoura, flying up Mount Cook in a helicopter, sailing out of Whitianga and watching the sun go down over Tolaga Bay. I spent a marvellous week in Fiji with Ms Herries and would love to go back in the summer, though I'd like to visit other Pacific Islands too.

So what about the College itself? What memories of the students will I take home with me? An initial general impression of beautiful smiling faces, hairstyles and lyrical names came into sharper focus as I got to know my students. Mangere College is teeming with talent. My first trip to the art room was revelatory and Crew 42's production was thrilling. I have been genuinely surprised and deeply moved

However the bleak reality of a world-wide recession has created a nasty undertone in domestic politics and I have been very aware of the serious changes made this year by the Government. Notions of equity are fading into the distance as "User Pays" becomes the slogan of a society dominated and divided by money.

As a result I am more convinced than ever that improving education is the single most important investment any country can make in its future. The beautiful scenery, wonderful wildlife and vital multi-cultural society of New Zealand have enriched my life immeasurably. This year has been more than a break from routine for me: it has been a real adventure in which I have made some life-long friends. The warmth and hospitality of staff and students at Mangere College will also be with me forever.

# Hodge's Holiday

## Mr Hodge's Story

One Monday morning I went into the staffroom of Ralph Allen School, where I have been teaching this year, to check the blackboard for notices. Someone had written: "WHERE THE HELL IS WESTERN SAMOA?". Underneath this, a reply: "NORTH OF NEW ZEALAND". Below: "WHERE THE HELL IS NEW ZEALAND?" I didn't mind. I was tired yet happy. I'd come back late the previous evening from Cardiff having watched Western Samoa beat Wales. I knew that they were really trying to stir up the Welsh members of staff and besides you get used to people asking where on earth do you come from.

I remember my first day at Ralph Allen. What a shock! A month in America had me still in travel mode and now the crunch. I had to work! It was bitterly cold and I had driven to school in the dark. There were no familiar smiling students to greet me just pale quizzical faces looking up:

"Are you an Australian?"

"No. I'm from New Zealand"

"Same thing."

Boy were these kids dumb... they didn't know a Kia Ora from a Kumara. However I soon found out they were not really much different from M.C students - they didn't laugh at my jokes either.

I found it very easy to fit into the English Education system as it is very similar to that of New Zealand. The staff have the same high level of professionalism and are very friendly and supportive. The students are eager to do well, to learn and to listen.

If it was easy to settle into school, English society was a different matter. Take something like going to a soccer game. It's football for a start. In New Zealand there are about four people watching, over here there are 40,000. You must wear your team's shirt with matching scarf and continuously sing or chant abuse to the other team, their supporters and the referee. If it's only four supporters you want, you go to 'rugger' and say "well done that man." and clap politely.

England is a fascinating place so full of people of every description, history and tradition. There is so much to see that you could go to a different place, museum, historical building or show everyday for

a year and still not have seen it all.

We didn't stay in England however. The first move was over the channel to France to eat snails in Paris. Ireland was next. The Irish are so friendly it was difficult to leave. I took a lot of photographs and notes. This, I thought, could revolutionise the M.C detention system.

Now that my year here is nearly over I have only one regret, it hasn't really been long enough. With so much to see and so little time it has meant that the friendships I have made have not had a chance to develop fully. When I return to New Zealand I know that it is the people, both colleagues and students that I will miss the most.

I have had a great time on Teachers Exchange. As they say over here... It's been a 'gurt wheeze'.

To achieve the illusion of three dimensions a low pressure air gun was used to spray on the shadows and details.

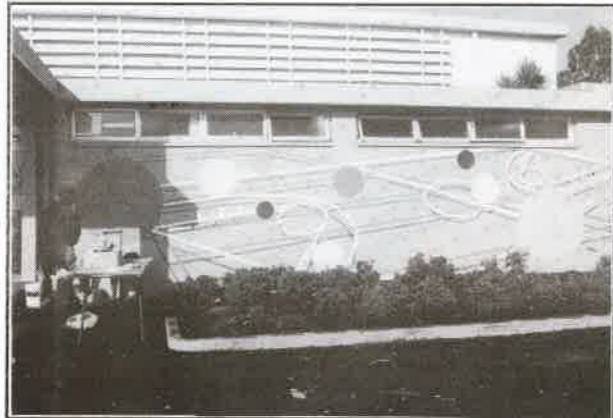
Some of us found we had particular skills.

Mr Vaughan says that they are an advantage as students will find them much easier to operate. As well as this Macintosh's have a greater range of software used for teaching. This was not available on the Apple 2E's.

The Macintosh Classic computer disks hold up to six times more information than the five and a quarter inch floppy disks.

Mr Vautier says of the Macintosh's, "They allow students to develop skills to be used in businesses."

On Friday 27 September the MC Tongan Group went out again, but this time it was for the Polynesian Speech Competition. Again we went out as a group.

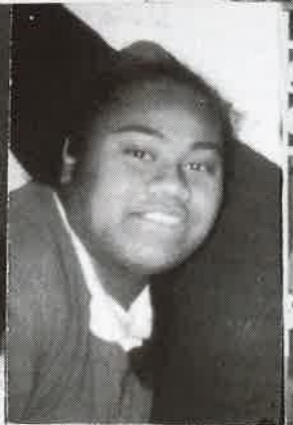
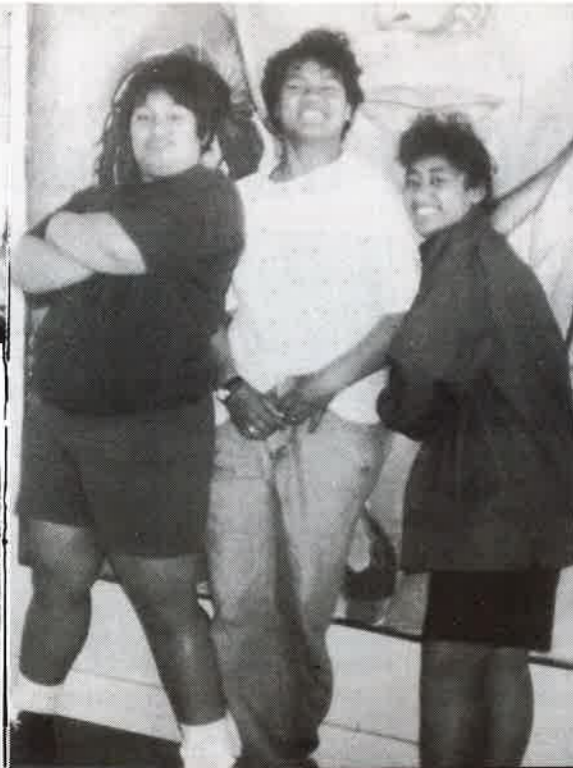
Ofa Tongotongo was the person who represented the Tongan Group for MC and out of 23 schools MC came in 5th Place.
