

Danny's priority was to save money to pay for his flight to the USA so that he could see his father. He didn't want his mother to have all the burden of paying for everything. He was a generous person who gave his sister \$20 every week, from the money he earned by working part-time in a bakery.

The very day he died he had bought a jug for his mother and family. The jug represented his love and was his last communication with his family. Unfortunately, its first use was for the mourners after his death.

He enjoyed going out with his friends, but his main aim was to get home early for work the next day. One of his close friends said, 'he was a caring person because he took care of his friends who had no place to sleep.'

All those who knew Danny will miss him very much, and will always have fond memories of him.

God brought him into this world and he took him back again, but still we are thankful for the time we had with him.

Mangere College has become renowned for the outstanding achievements of its art students, Mr White's teaching being the main reason.






Mathex is an annual event run by the Auckland Mathematical Association and sponsored mainly by Casio. It is open to all form one to four students in the greater Auckland area.





This year Mangere College had four netball teams playing in two separate competitions and two Auckland-wide tournaments.


