

The Principal's Report

It is now well known that I have decided to retire at the end of Term 1, 2003.

I want to leave the school well placed to address and cater for the future needs of our students. Leaving at the end of Term 1 in 2003 will give the Board of Trustees sufficient time to advertise for and appoint my successor. It will also enable the current senior management team to ensure that the 2003 school year is effectively organized, the school fully staffed and parents, staff and students well prepared for a leadership change.

I was appointed as Principal of Mangere College in April 1996. During my time at the school I have strived

to ensure that our students have been provided with a quality education, that parents and caregivers have been involved in and well informed about, the education of their children and that the commitment and professionalism of Mangere College staff have been supported and acknowledged.

Thanks to the support, dedication and energy of staff, a number of initiatives have been introduced during my time as Principal. The AIMHI project, which has had a major impact on Mangere College, has supported several of these programmes. These include:

- the appointment of CLOs (Community Liaison Officers),
- providing a Technology programme for Year 7 and 8 students from local primary schools,
- evaluating the effectiveness of our teaching programmes and measuring student progess using the AIMHI tests,
- introducing Assessment for Better Learning (ABeL) strategies,
- the very effective 'Coaching' programme that was established this year.

Other developments have been:

- the sponsorship programme that has established constructive links with local businesses and provided financial support to many students,
- upgrading the school's information technology (IT) facility and establishing a school-wide IT network,
- obtaining a First Point of Contact contract that has enabled the school to provide quality health services for students,
- effectively hosting the ASB BANK Auckland Secondary Schools Maori and Pacific Islands Cultural Festival in 1999 and 2000,

- establishing the Achievement Centre which provides quality educational opportunities for students who have not experienced success in traditional school settings,
- maintaining and upgrading property, including the refurbishment of the Technology area, the establishment of a Student Services Centre and the current developments in S Block.

I am particularly proud of the extent to which students' attitudes to achievement have changed during my seven years as Principal. In December 1996, at the end of my first year at Mangere College, the first AIMHI

research report was released. This was titled 'Towards Making Achievement Cool'. This report identified factors that were hindering the achievement of students in the AIMHI schools and challenged these schools to 'make it cool for students to achieve'. I believe Mangere College has responded very positively to this challenge and staff have been able to lift the level of student achievement and make students feel proud about their achievements.

The Education Review Office (ERO) report undertaken this year acknowledges the commitment of Mangere College staff and the effectiveness of our teaching and pastoral programmes.

am heartened by the overall positiveness of this report and the endorsement it gives to the many dedicated MC staff and all our conscientious students.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to formally thank the Board of Trustees for the support that has always been provided to me. I also acknowledge the commitment that the Board has shown to staff, students and to the Mangere community. I have valued the Board's dedication, friendship and faith in my leadership.

It has been a privilege to have been Principal of Mangere College and I will always consider myself to be part of the Mangere College family.

Best wishes to all students, staff, parents, caregivers and friends of Mangere College. You are the spirit of the school and through your commitment you will ensure a positive future for our young people.

May you all have an exciting, challenging and rewarding future. Always 'Seek the Heights' and be proud when you say "I went to Mangere College".

The formation of the Mangere College Interact Club has been of special interest to me this year. This is a service orientated club sponsored by the Rotary Club of Mangere.




We received a proposition from the Principal this year. He proposed to give the council \$1000 per term

Tony Searle is our 'Computer Man'. It is therefore not surprising that he likes computers and everything to do with computers. He dislikes people who do not listen.



Our ERO Visit

The Education Review Office (ERO) undertook a the Board's self review procedures. comprehensive review of Mangere College this year.

The Board of Trustees asked the ERO team to focus on the quality of teaching programmes and the effectiveness of pastoral support that Mangere College provides students. The reviewers also chose to evaluate

The reviewers were very impressed by the quality of the education and pastoral support Mangere College students are receiving.

The following letter to our parents and community was written by ERO following their visit.



October 2002

To the Parents and Community of Mangere College

These are the findings of the Education Review Office's latest report on Mangere College.

Mangere College is a school at the heart of its community. The board and staff celebrate the school's multicultural composition. In particular, the school acknowledges the significant Polynesian student community and staff emphasise a strong sense of whanau, aiga and family within the college.

The school, through the AIMHI (Achievement in Multicultural High Schools) Forum, is developing a strong and supportive learning culture that acknowledges the emotional needs of its students. A wide range of support services provides students with strong pastoral care, health, careers and transition education. Two programmes are particularly effective, the in-class coaching initiative and the provision made for alternative education in the Achievement Centre.

A positive school tone is clearly evident throughout the school. Teachers understand their students well and actively support them to achieve their goals. Students are friendly and have pride in their school.

Staff are reflective and highly committed to developing their teaching skills. High quality teaching practices are evident in some learning areas. In other learning areas the quality of teaching is less well developed.

The principal is leading the development of the school well. He works effectively with the students, staff, board and community. His collegial management style, accessibility and professional focus on the needs of the students are crucial elements in the school's growth. The principal and board have established a clear sense of direction for the ongoing development of the school.

The board is supportive of the school's vision and development. Trustees have a shared vision and a willingness to continue to improve the governance and management of the school through effective communication. The development of the new strategic plan has been completed in consultation with the school community. The implementation of a robust self-review system to monitor progress will be critical to the success of the board's strategic plan.

The board and ERO agreed on three focus areas for this review. These were the impact of teaching and learning programmes on student achievement, provisions for student support and self-review processes. Trustees and staff believe that these developments have had a significant impact on student achievement.

Mangere College will be reviewed again as part of the regular schedule of Education Review Office reviews.

Review Coverage

ERO reviews do not cover every aspect of school performance and each ERO report may cover different issues. The aim is to provide information on aspects that are central to student achievement and useful to this

After some discussion it was decided that we would support the Rotary based project to eradicate the disease of polio. The group received a fund raising proposition from the current President of the Mangere Rotary group, Ms Lois Kirkbride, to cater for some teacher/parent functions to be held at Favona Primary School. Thanks to the catering skills of group members and huge support from Mrs Sheerin we were able to support four of these evenings.

At the time of writing this article the group had raised \$400 towards its international project.

In September the group organised a pizza and ice skating evening. Members certainly did justice to 'The Works' at Pizza Hut and then found plenty of energy at the Paradice ice rink.

The new MC Interact Club has certainly made an impact this year. We look forward to the coming year when Nate Molia will take up the role of President. We all wish her well with this challenge.

Outward Bound Experiences

In 2002, ten Mangere College students received full sponsorship for Outward Bound, 'Mind Body and Soul' courses. This support was worth \$30,000.

In February, Malaina Vaotuua, Stacey Roberts and Papa Williams experienced the 22-day Outward Bound Mind Body and Soul course thanks to sponsorship from Yellow Ribbon.

Year 12 students, Puhihuia Wade, Elisa Aupouri and Mavai Mataiti were the next group of students to accept the Outward Bound challenge. Puhihuia and Elisa were sponsored by Hubbard Foods and Mavai by the Quattro Foundation.

Next, the Sir Woolf Fisher Trust sponsored Anita Kumar and Kasey-Anne Ng Chok, and Hotel Grand Chancellor, Auckland Airport, sponsored Dawn Nabong on the 22-day Outward Bound course.

Myra Tavu'i was the tenth MC student to attend the course, thanks to Yellow Ribbon support. Myra is experiencing the Outward Bound challenges as this report is being finalised.

For Mangere College to have ten students sponsored on Outward Bound courses in one year must be a record for any New Zealand school.

Mangere College appreciates the outstanding level of financial support provided by the companies and organisations listed in this report. They have enabled ten outstanding students to live the Outward Bound experience and, in doing so, develop confidence and leadership skills that will undoubtedly benefit them, the school and our society in the future.

An Experience of a Lifetime

I expected Outward Bound to be like a three week holiday! Wrong! Although I was far from MC, at Anakiwa in the Marlborough Sounds, I was still a student and still expected to learn.

Outward Bound is the sort of school that teaches young and old the important qualities that are needed to succeed and survive.

Self-awareness, self-management, self-belief, self-esteem and social skills were promoted in a positive way during the 22 day Outward Bound course.

Outward Bound threw challenges at me that seemed impossible and were physically, mentally and emotionally draining. But thanks to Outward Bound, I gained the ability to face these challenges and developed the confidence to conquer them. I was also lucky enough to meet a great group of strangers who later became my friends and family. Their trust, teamwork and co-operation also helped me accomplish the Outward Bound challenges.

Outward Bound activities included: sailing in rigged cutters (which was fun, except when the wind dropped and we had to row to our destination), sea and river kayaking, a solo experience (which involved 3 days in the outdoors completely alone!), the high ropes course, bush expeditions (tramping for 2 or 3 days), rock climbing, community service, and most importantly, general fitness which was developed with running, swimming, and aerobics in the early hours of the morning.

It is hard to fully explain my 22 days at Outward Bound. You have to experience it for yourself in order to appreciate the true extent of the challenges and the quality of the rewards.

Being on the course has been the best thing that I have ever done in my entire life. Outward Bound gave me the opportunity to face some fears and some very difficult challenges that I would not normally dream of doing. It has really made me open up my eyes about the world and what life really is about.

My greatest thanks go to the Quattro Foundation for the sponsorship that enabled me to attend the course and enjoy 'an experience of a lifetime'.






Finally JIREH entertained with their mix of dance, song and comedy.

As I was running down the stairs, I thought, "Is this the last day of my life?" I felt a strange feeling of inner peace. I will never forget that moment.


When we finally came out of the building, the police were moving everyone along. I looked up at the towers and saw that both buildings were sliced open. I couldn't believe my eyes. It was so real.




Now, as I reflect on those events, they have impressed on me that I really need to have my priorities right. That first things in life should always be first.



The most outstanding feature of the new entrance way was provided by Taniela Taniela and Mikaloni Moli. These two Year 13 students returned to school after





A mural painted by students during the 2000 Wider Living Week was presented to the Auckland Office of the Ministry of Education this year.

The students were given the challenge of creating a large work that reflects Mangere College's multicultural identity.

Head of Art, Mike Christo explained that the artists chose to blend a variety of Pacific patterns with a fish motif. The contrast between the light and dark colours and the expressive nature of the brushwork helped create the emotional intensity of the piece.

Mr Christo sees the work as 'a great example of collaboration and young people working together. The mural could have only happened in a collaborative spirit as its size and competence level is far beyond the standard that could be achieved by a single student acting as an individual'.

The mural now hangs in the main corridor outside the Ministry's meeting rooms.

A Junior Choir, which was established late in the year, acquitted itself with credit at Junior Prizegiving. We now have a good base on which to build a full choir in 2003.

During the year MC students had many opportunities to experience a wide range of musical performances. These included two Auckland Philharmonia concerts, which delivered world premiers of New Zealand Composers' Works, plus the ever popular '1812 Overture' by Tchaikovsky and a dress rehearsal of 'The Marriage of Figaro', a popular opera by Mozart.

There were also concerts at Mangere College. The outstanding New Zealand percussion group 'Strike' enthralled our students with a brilliant performance. Potential drummers in the audience were inspired by the group. Later in the year, a group from the New Zealand Opera Company (Class Act Opera) put on an hilarious version of Donizetti's 'The Elixir of Love'. The main characters were based on famous New Zealanders such as Rachel Hunter.

Vocal and instrumental groups from Mangere College excelled themselves at the Manukau Secondary Schools' Performing Arts Awards in August. The Year 10 Band 'Pacific Angels', consisting of Sarah Palenapa, Tuteru Samson, Kone Palenapa, Tema Tuaimalo and Sela Mahe, won the popular group section. Sela Mahe came second by a whisker in the popular solo vocal section.

The staff of the Music Department look forward to 2003 when they will continue working with Mangere College students. The talents of these students make music teaching at Mangere College a real pleasure.

The mural will provide a spectacular welcome to all who visit Mangere College.




Social Sciences and Science


