The Principal's Report

I have now come to the end of my third term at Mangere College. I have had a wonderful three terms and consider myself extremely fortunate to have been appointed principal at Mangere College.

The challenge of following on from Mr Pedder was one that both pleased and worried me. Mr Pedder left a school that was in extremely good heart and it was a wonderful feeling to be welcomed by both staff and students of the college. It was also pleasing to have the school running so smoothly that it gave me the chance to find my way around the college and the college systems before I had to begin to make any important decisions.

My worries were that having to follow on from Mr Pedder I might make some bad decisions. However, the school proved to be the winner and the fact that Mangere College is such a supportive environment for all who come here meant that I have been allowed to forget about my worries.

It has been a real pleasure to work with the Board of Trustees as the school has re-examined its Mission and Values. The core idea of **Excellence in Education for the students of Mangere** proved to be non-negotiable and it remains absolutely central to the work that we carry out.

Even before Mr Pedder retired the school was aware that the Ministry of Education was seeking to re-define its relationship with the AIMHI Forum. By the time we came to the end of term three it was apparent that the Ministry was quite serious about wishing to remove most of its financial support for the programmes that had underpinned the success of the AIMHI Forum's developments. At the time of going to print in term four the AIMHI Forum - the collective of principals and boards from the nine AIMHI schools - is still finalising what the shape of the forum will be in 2004 and beyond. We all share a level of frustration that the success shown by all the AIMHI schools over the past years should now be 'rewarded' by the Ministry taking funding away.

Over the course of term three the New Zealand Qualifications Authority carried out a check on the school's management systems for national assessment for qualifications. The report was thorough and provided some useful suggestions for the ways that the college might improve its systems, but the most pleasing aspect of the report was the conclusion that read: Mangere College is commended for the internal processes that have been put in place for managing national assessment. It is evident that these processes have been implemented in all areas of the school and that departments have developed their own policies and procedures within the parameters of the school's documentation to suit their requirements. Needless to say we were all delighted that the hard work that all members of staff had made to deliver the National Certificate at Levels One and Two had been shown to have been worth it, and that the community of Mangere College can have absolute faith in the quality of the qualifications that they receive.

For me many of the enduring memories of the year are the ones that involve our students. Week in and week out it was the faces of the students who represented the college in a whole variety of activities that stood out. This is an impressive feature of our students – they play hard and fair and give of their best, and while they always play to win they know that success can prove to be elusive.

So let me share with you some of these faces:

- the faces of all the students who represented the college so well at the Manukau Schools Music competition.
- the smiles on the faces of the amazing range of students who played for the school's sports teams.
- the faces of our Year 12 students as they set off for their visit to Massey University in Palmerston North.
- the faces of all the students who so willingly offered billets to our guests from Canala in New Caledonia, and I could go on.

So it is now the time to look ahead. 2004 will prove a challenge for all schools in New Zealand as three levels of internal and external assessment have to be faced. We are fortunate that our Board of Trustees has recognised the part that it can play in assisting the teaching staff of Mangere College to manage this level of assessment. The timetable arrangement that the Board of Trustees has approved that sees one period a week being devoted to staff development will go a long way to ensuring that Mangere College is able to maintain the high standard of teacher professionalism towards both curriculum delivery and assessment.

We also need to look ahead to the college finalising its revised strategic plan. We have already signalled our commitment to raising the literacy and numeracy levels of all students entering the college. We also have commenced our work on looking at how the NCEA achievements of our students can inform our practice as teachers. With the detailed information that the NCEA provides about each student's ability within the various aspects of each curriculum area we know we need to look carefully at how we work with students in the following year to ensure that their programme of learning follows logically on from their achievements of the previous year. We also know that we will not always get it right the first time, but each small step that we take in the right direction is still a giant leap beyond what we were able to do under the old system of SC and Bursary.

And so we come to the end of 2003. We should all be well satisfied that another step has been taken in the growth of the college. We sometimes need to pause and remind ourselves that as each year goes by we are making history and that with the passage of time individual years lose their distinction and become part of the continuum that people make when they live and work in a particular place.

And this brings me to Ms Erickson. Ms Erickson has announced her intention to retire from the college at the end of Term 1, 2004. Ms Erickson is a foundation member of this college and as such she is a colleague who has devoted thirty-three years of her life to education in Mangere. It will be a wrench for us all to farewell her next year. I do wish to take this opportunity now to acknowledge her service to thousands of students who have passed through this school.

As other principals have said before me, and many others will say in the future, it is up to each one of us to be proud of the connections that we have with this college, and to always strive to 'Seek the Heights'.


Right now I really don't know what the future holds for me. I guess that I am just going to take the days as they come until I decide what I want to do.






This year's model United Nations Assembly (MUNA) took place at Auckland Girls Grammar School over two days in June. Our team of international diplomats (Emma, Lomitusi and Simi) accompanied by Dr Peddie as their counsellor, had the difficult and sometimes unenviable task of representing Australia in a wide range of international debates. For the purposes of the Assembly, each of the 75 schools present had to represent their allotted nations and speak on their behalf. Under the capable chairmanship of the Hon Jonathan Hunt MP who took the role of Secretary General, each delegation had opportunities to convince the Assembly that their nation's interest should be supported. It was an interesting and colourful learning experience and the standard of debate was high. We debated such topics as whether or not women should be allowed to have combat

roles in warfare, whether or not the UN should take over in Iraq and Afghanistan, and whether or not nations such as Tonga and PNG should be placed under UN mandate.

One of the highlights was the visit of the Prime Minister, Helen Clark. Ms Clark gave an interesting and entertaining explanation of how New Zealand's stand on various issues is maintained even when large nations are pressurising us to change our policies.

Our delegates spoke in all but one of the seven debates and their speeches were well received. We also had to hold our position in the face of considerable opposition and try to negotiate with other delegations via diplomatic notes. This year our delegation did not win one of the major prizes, but the team agreed that the experience had been well worthwhile and the College hopes to get involved again next year.

One year older, the Student Services facility in the H block continues to be an awesome place to work says





Once we had all had a few swims trying to ferry-glide and make the S turns at Reids' farm we decided to pack up and head towards Aniwhenua.




Girls' Rugby






SECOND XV REPORT 2003


Swimming Sports

Under 19 Boys' Basketball


