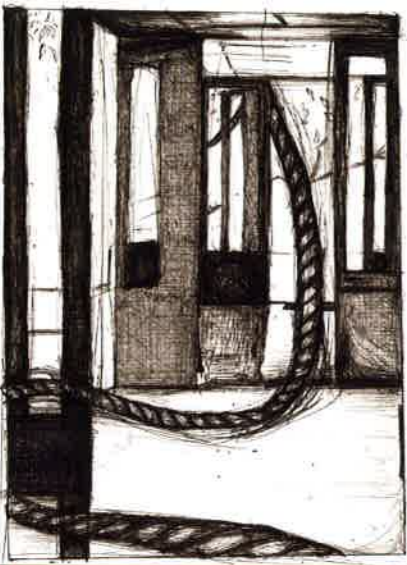

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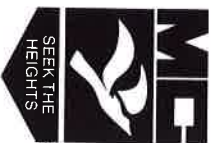

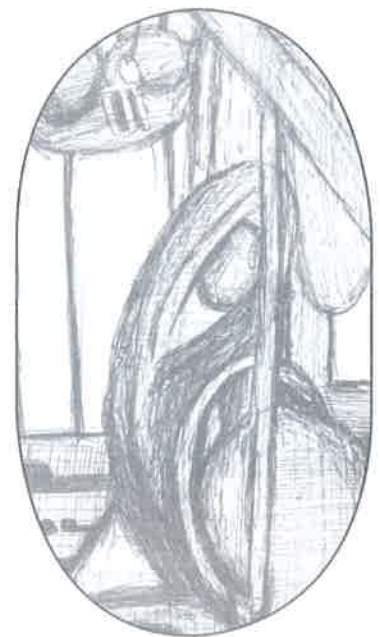

I wish to take as my theme the vision statement from the Mangere College Charter which says: *Excellence in education for the students of Mangere.*

I do this because 2005 has been an exceptional year for the variety of activities in which our students have excelled.

The year got off to a superb start when we learnt that Ruth Pouli, our Head Girl in 2004, had been named as the top scholar in New Zealand in Samoan language in the 2004 Level 3, NCEA exams. It was with a great deal of pride that Mrs Ah Sam and I accompanied Ruth and her family to Government House in Wellington to support her as she received her honour from the Governor-General.

However just as in previous years it was the overall achievement of the senior students in the 2004 NCEA that continued to please us.

In 2004 we had set ourselves the target of reducing the number of senior students who achieved fewer than 42 credits in a year. In 2003 37% of our senior students had achieved fewer than 42 credits and we were delighted to find out at the beginning of this year, when the results came through, that we had met our target when only 30% of the 2004 senior students achieved fewer than 42 credits.

Further to this we had set ourselves another target of increasing the number of our senior students who achieved a National Certificate. We had set ourselves the target of 41% in 2004 and we were delighted to find out that the students actually achieved a 48% success rate. When we broke this down even further we were very pleased to find out that 80% of our year 13 students in 2004 achieved a National Certificate.

We have been saying for many years that the longer a student stays at Mangere College then the greater the opportunity becomes for success and we now have the data that proves this.

To all you seniors today I put out the invitation that if you are not happy with your results when they come through next January you need to remember that you are welcome to return to MC to gain the qualifications that you need, and do remember that courses at MC are basically free and so cost much less than bridging courses at either University or a Technical Institute.

Before I leave the academic achievements of our 2004 students I do wish to report that once again when the national data is looked at on an ethnic basis we are gratified to see that our Maori and Pasifika students continue to out-perform their ethnic cohorts in the rest of the country. This means that when our students wish to gain Merit or Excellence in their NCEA we know that in most of the curriculum areas they stand more chance of gaining this at Mangere College than at other schools in the country.

In the varied areas of extra-curricular activity we have again had a wonderful year:

In Sport:

- The Senior Boys Kilikiti team were finalists in their grade.
- In Waka Ama – all our teams were finalists – and the boys and mixed team ended up as champions in Auckland, and the boys' team went on to be finalists at Nationals and the mixed team also became National Champions.
- Our Senior Premier Girls' Volleyball team came 4th in Auckland and went on to become Division 2 champions at Nationals.
- At this point in time our Junior Premier Girls' Volleyball team has won all their games and are now playing in the Auckland championships.
- Our Girls' rugby team ended up as plate champions, our U15 Rugby team were championship semi-finalists, and our 2nd XV became 2B champions.
- Our U19 Girls Basketball came 2nd= in the Manukau competition.
- The Premier Netball team came 3rd in the Manukau competition, and the Year 9 Netball team were Manukau Champions.

It is quite exceptional for a school of our size to be able to boast of achievements such as these. These results bear testimony to the sporting talents of our students, our staff, and the wider Mangere Community who all work together to ensure this level of success.

In music our solo contemporary singers Sarah Palenapa, Peter Alova and Melaia Ofaahengaue came 1st, 2nd and 3rd in the Manukau Secondary School Performing Arts Awards, and our contemporary band of Siosaia Folau, Jessie Te Weehi, Christian Tuimauga, Mike Frost and Joshua Rako came 1st.

In visual arts Vaomalo Uimaitua won the Konica Minolta Secondary Schools Art Exhibition, and it was his and other arts' students' work from 2004 that was used by NZQA as the national exemplars of achievement, merit and excellence at level 2 Practical Art. Any art student in the country attempting level 2 Art has Mangere College student art work as their models of excellence. Further to this Vaomalo was later approached by NZQA for one of his art works to be used as the image for the NZQA 2005 Christmas Card.

In dance our Hip Hop group were Manukau Champions and finished 3rd in the National Bring it On competition.

At the beginning of this year we again were delighted with the number of our students who celebrated their cultural heritage in the Festival. Our Niuean, Tongan, Samoan, Cook Island and Kapa Haka groups were wonderful ambassadors for the college.

For the first time our senior catering students entered the National Secondary Schools' Culinary Challenge and Natasha Vailua and Maria Vaimasenu'u were awarded Bronze Medals for their efforts.

And in the last school holidays a number of our senior students took part in the Plantation Business Challenge, sponsored by both MIT and AUT, and the team of Laila Turner, Munesh Naidu, Beverly Papeau, and Maria Vaimasenu'u each won \$2,000 scholarships for their efforts.

On Monday of this week we were delighted with the presentation of a First Foundation scholarship to Lameko Laa of year 12. While we have had students shortlisted in the past for this award Meko is our first recipient. He now receives mentoring and holiday employment for the next four years as well as all the costs of his undergraduate degree.

And all of these achievements were the result of the students and the staff of Mangere College working together to achieve excellence.

Health continues to play a central part in our role as a secondary school in South Auckland. In particular it has been a pleasure to see the increasing role that our Student Health Council has played. The Health Week in Term 3 was a great success with the only negative being the fact of the poor weather. It has also been gratifying to see the way that Auckland University has worked with the Student Health Council to commence the work on Living 4 Life, an obesity prevention project; in particular I wish to acknowledge the work that Jody Warbrick from the Auckland University has done with our students. Paralleling this has been the work that the Diabetes Projects Trust has initiated with our year 9 students, and here I wish to acknowledge the work that Lama Saga and his team have carried out.

We have also been pleased to continue the refurbishment of the teaching and learning conditions at Mangere College. As a consequence of Student Council recommendations we finally completed a concrete path from the back gate across the field at the beginning of this year. Then in Term 2 we began the modernisation work on many of the H Block classrooms. This work went very smoothly and it is a pleasure to now have 6 brand new classrooms to complement the new classrooms in S block. We are now hoping to be able to continue this work over the next few years as we make our way around the other blocks in the school.

It is important that I acknowledge those colleagues that are leaving us at the end of this year. Ms Flawn is taking a break from teaching and her presence in the PE and Health department will be missed. Ms Aukuso has taken a management position at Robertson Road School and we wish her every happiness as she returns to the primary teaching service. Ms Ikimotu is leaving us to further her academic qualifications and we look forward to following her achievements with interest. Ms Reisima has resigned from her position as HoD PE and Health in order to go travelling for at least the next two years. We thank Ms Reisima for her work with the students of Mangere College and we will miss her presence in both the gym, the classroom, and the staffroom. We also farewell Mr Filo from his role as student mentor and also wish him success in his future endeavours.

As I have said before the only way that we can achieve our vision of Excellence in education for the students of Mangere is to make sure that staff and students have every opportunity both inside and outside the classroom to work together to make this happen.

I thank both the students and the staff of Mangere College in 2005 for taking these significant steps towards achieving our vision, and I look forward to 2006 as we take our next steps towards Seeking the Heights.

It is almost a decade since I became a member of the Board of Trustees of Mangere College. In that time I have seen enormous changes within the school. One of the initiatives that has had a profound effect on teaching and outcomes at Mangere College has been the work of the AIMHI Forum (Achievement in Multicultural High Schools), which is currently celebrating ten years of making a real difference to the High Schools of our area.

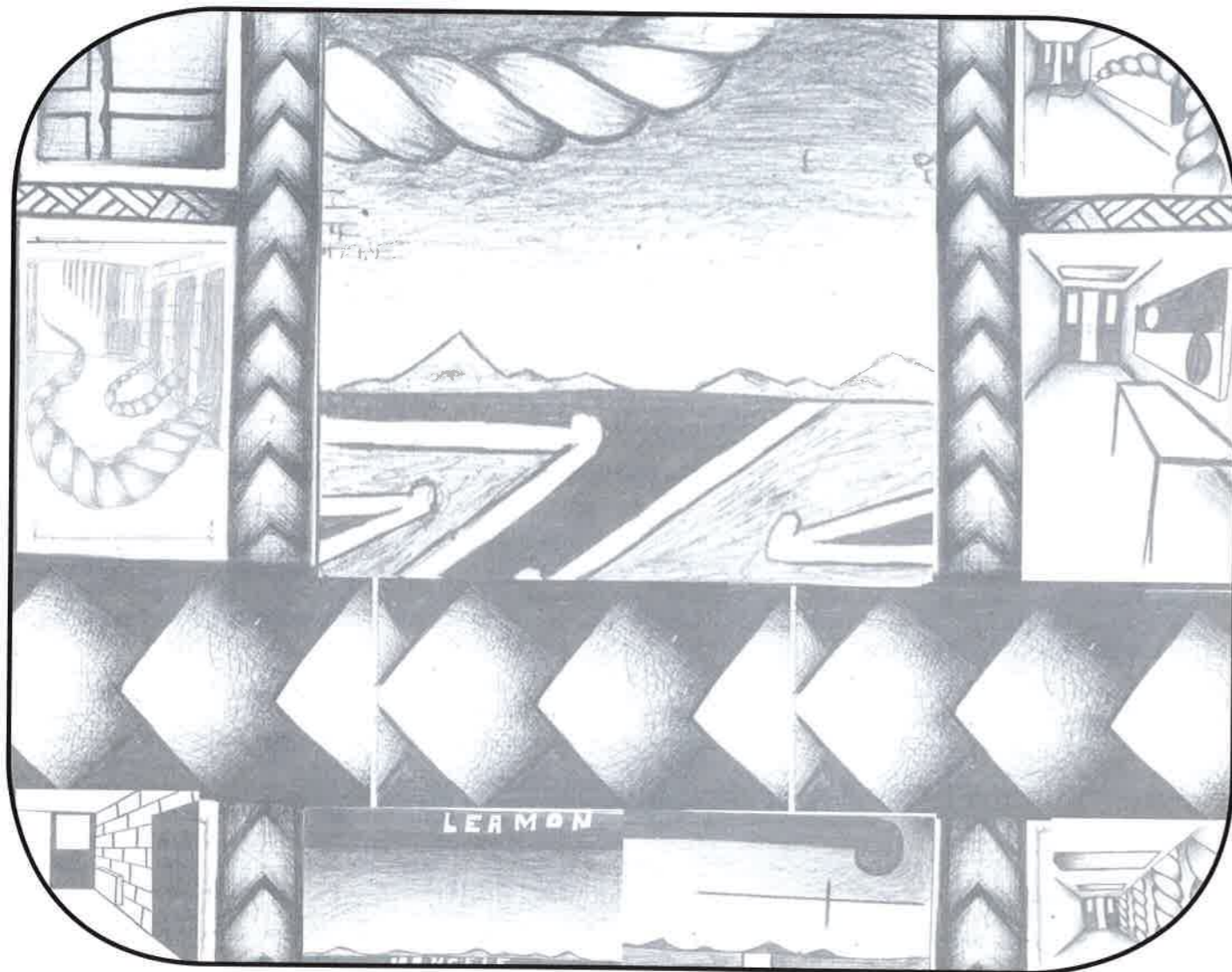

A squad of three associates consisting of Maile Molia, Poimasitina Lematua-Motu and Samisoni Tike represented the Kingdom of Tonga at this year's Mini United Nations Association held at Auckland Girls 'DOROTHY WINSTONE CENTRE' on Friday 10th and Saturday 11th June. Maile played the role of the Princess of Tonga, Poima her security guard and Samisoni the Cabinet minister.

Our team had a huge advantage because Maile and Samisoni's mother tongue language is Tongan and they were able to articulate some of our remits in Tongan. The traditional dress was also easily accessed. Delegates were required to wear the traditional clothing of their represented country. Our team wore black on Friday due to the death of one of the nobles "Vaha'i" in Tonga, and we were paying our respects by wearing black and the traditional waist mats. Poimasitina being of Samoan descendant learnt to put on a Tongan waist mat and familiarise herself with the Tongan Language.

The preparation was made before the Conference for remits. Mr. Edwards assisted our topics and content and was also our driver for the two days. We spoke on remits about the "International authority under United Nations" direction being established to regulate the international trade in human body parts and facilitate stem cell research. The United Nations is calling upon all members to refrain from the practice of 'out sourcing' work to less developed countries in effort to reduce world poverty, and 'Global warming being recognised as the most serious environmental issue facing the planet

and measures are identified to reduce the threat'.

Tonga was part of the Asia Oceania block which meant we sat with representatives from countries like New Zealand, Australia, Fiji, Papa New Guinea to name a few.

The Mini United Nations Conference enabled the participants to experience speaking to a large number of people and to use the knowledge we had in History to direct our perspectives on specific topics. Debating skills in addition to both listening and communicating skills were used during this two day event.

Delegates were not allowed to stand up during a discussion. We found that note passing was an ideal way to pass on messengers to allied countries.

This event was an entertaining yet an educational practice for the three participants. We like to encourage more Mangere College students to take on their debating skills with communications skills and take part in events such as the Mini United Nations Conference.

Ms K Unuia

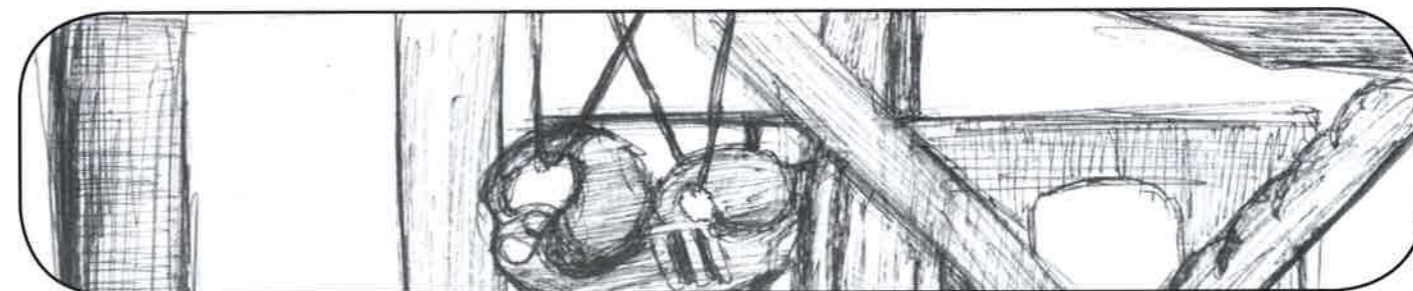

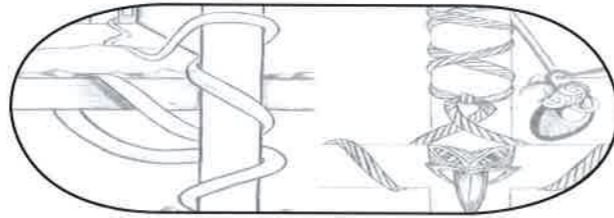


Kulupu Tonga

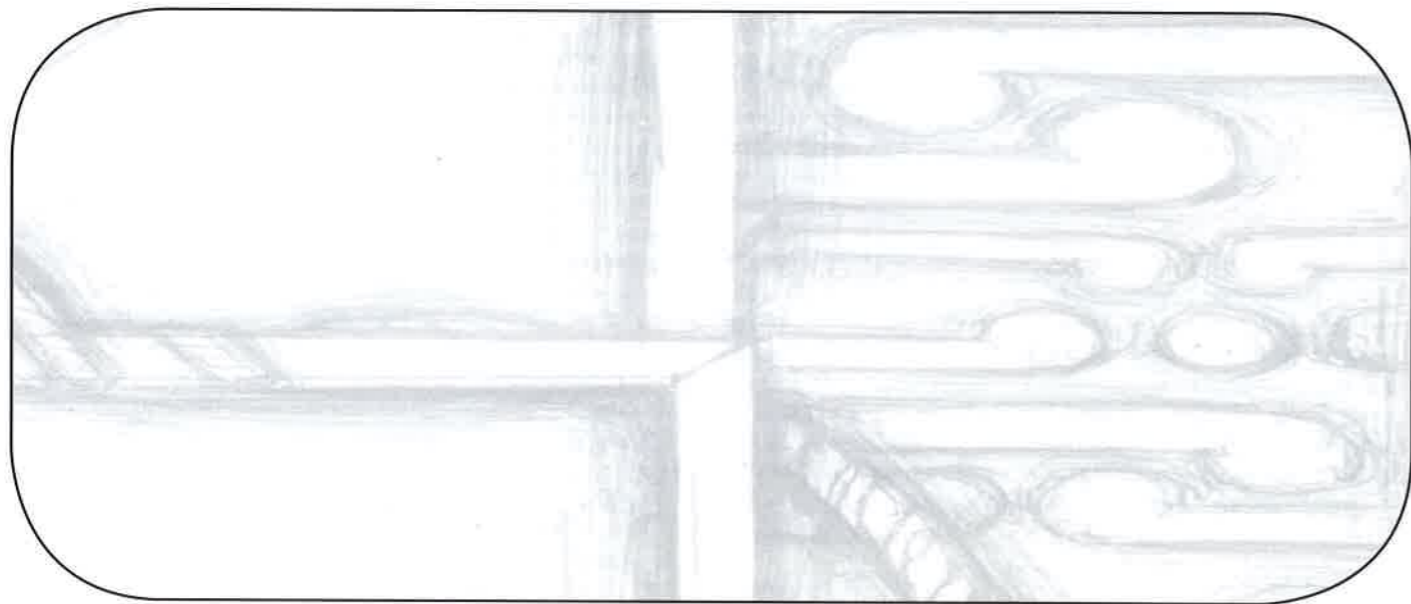

To the Leaders of tomorrow, it is hard work but you must have patience and passion for your culture. Hold your head high no matter what the outcome and always "Seek the Heights".

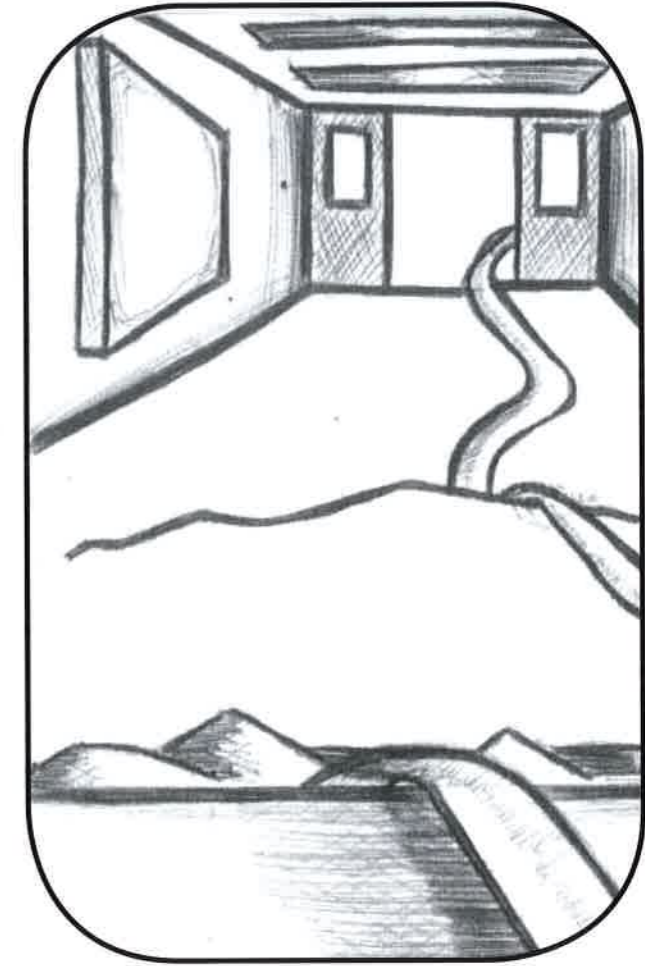

Maths Department

In 2005 the Mangere College Mathematics Department offered three courses at each year level. In the junior school Band 1 catered for the more able students while in Band 3 a remedial course was designed to assist students to reach their appropriate level in maths. In the Senior school Band 1 classes sat the main Mathematics Achievement Standards while Band 2, and 3 sat a combination of unit and Achievement Standards. At Yr 13 we offered Level 3 statistics.

The Department has worked to improve its resources and this year new class sets of text books were purchased along with class sets of scientific and graphics calculators. A new staff workroom was completed and a science laboratory converted into a maths teaching space. In 2006 further improvements in resources are planned with upgrades to classrooms and the purchase of more textbooks.

A large part of the Departments expenditure in the past has been photocopying and with the increase in assessment particularly at the senior level we have had to pass some of this cost on to parents with the \$5 math fee. Thank you for your contribution in this regard, in 2006 this fee, due to the purchase of texts will be reduced and included in the stationary requirement.

This year Ms Cresswell has facilitated the Numeracy project within the school. This is an initiative which continues the work that is begun in primary school. Many schools in the country are involved. Mangere College has gained much from this project including material resources and staff professional development.

Music Department

2005 has been a busier and more productive year than previous ones with the introduction of many new units of work embracing the NCEA course and Unit Standards in the Performing Arts and Musical Knowledge. Such units include 'Management of a PA system' and the 'Production of Sound', 'Sound Mixing', 'Lighting' and 'Recording Techniques', 'The New Zealand Music Industry' to name but a few. These give students a wider range of topics from which to choose, and enables them to achieve according to their strengths.

We continued to support the 'CHILD HEART FOUNDATION' and this year Sarah Palenapa, Malaia Ofahengaue and Lilipeti Mahe sang at their annual church service at St. Matthew-in-the-City. Heart-shaped balloons representing children who had died of heart disease were released outside commemorating their lives in a moving way.

Our students excelled themselves in the Manukau Secondary Schools' Performing Arts Awards Contest with Sarah Palenapa, Malaia Ofahengaue and Peter Alofa making the finals of the Contemporary Solo Section of the competition. Results: Sarah 1st, Peter 2nd, Malaia 3rd. Not to be outdone, the Year 10 Band of

Maths week held in term 3 and run by Mr Hormes involved the junior school enrolling on line for the New Zealand Census at School. All Yr 9 and 10 students registered and answered questions about themselves and mathematics. Thousands of students from many schools entered data which can now be used in mathematics.

In Maths week a competition was run with a group of students from each junior class answering problem solving questions. 10Im and 9Pi were winners at each year level.

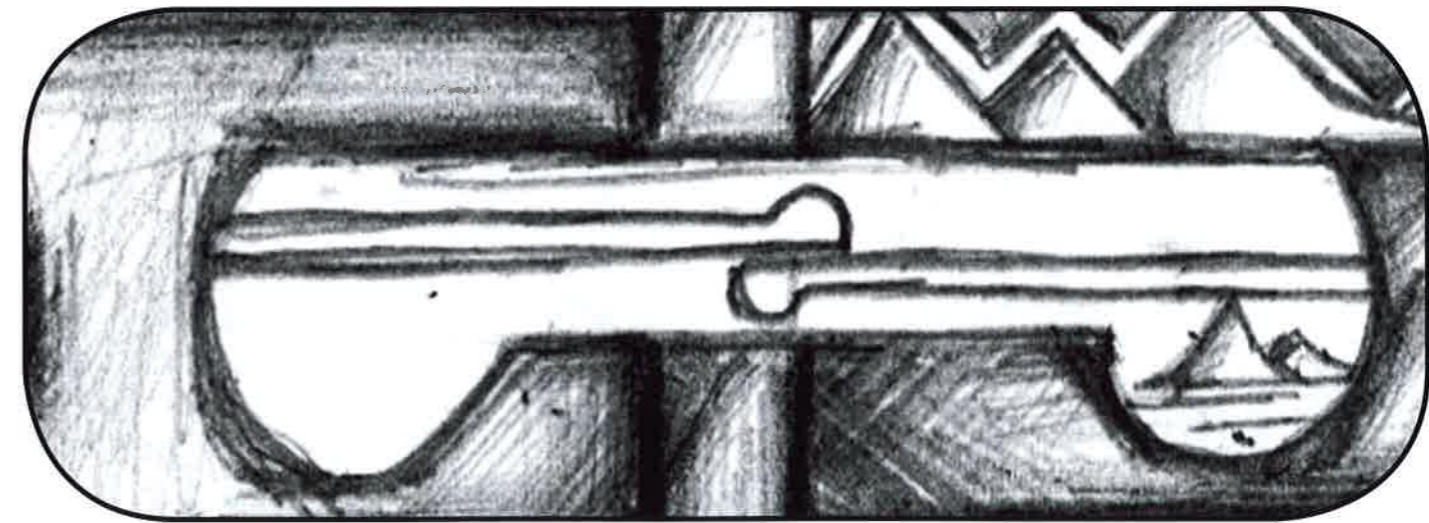

The day of departure had come. Host families were sad to say good bye to the New Caledonian students,

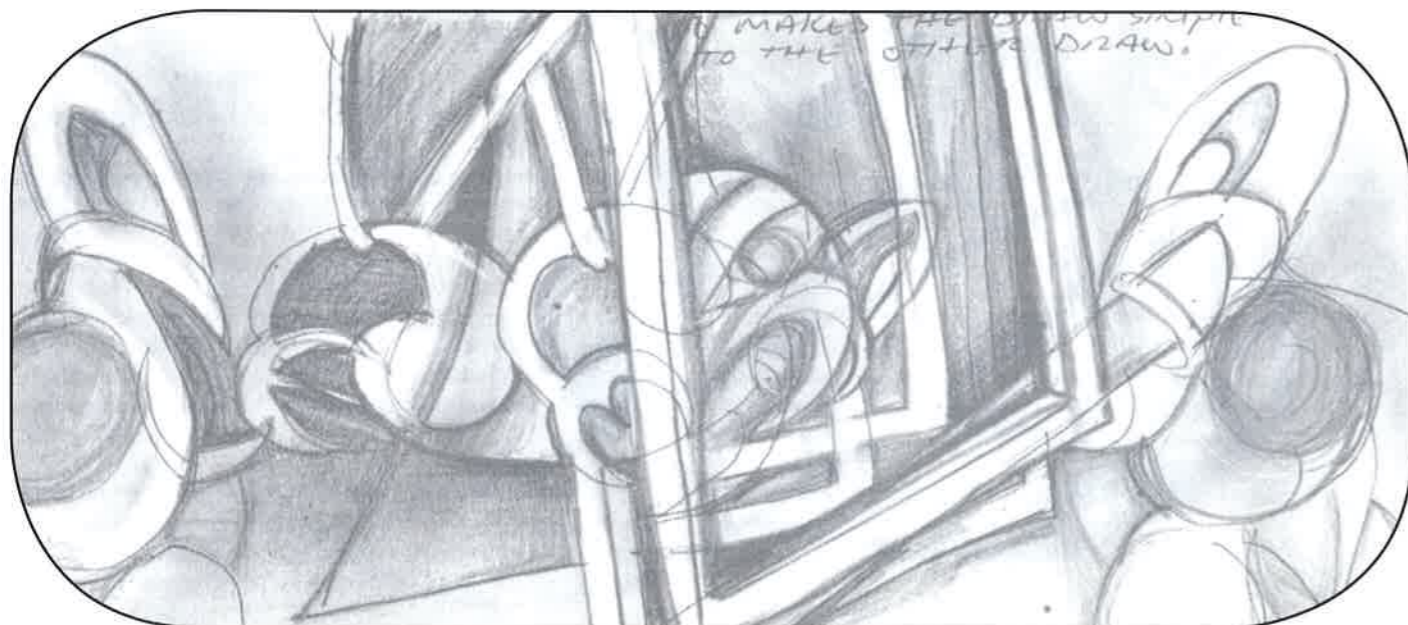

Our days would last as long as 17 – 18 hours, beginning at 0540 and lights out at 2300hrs.

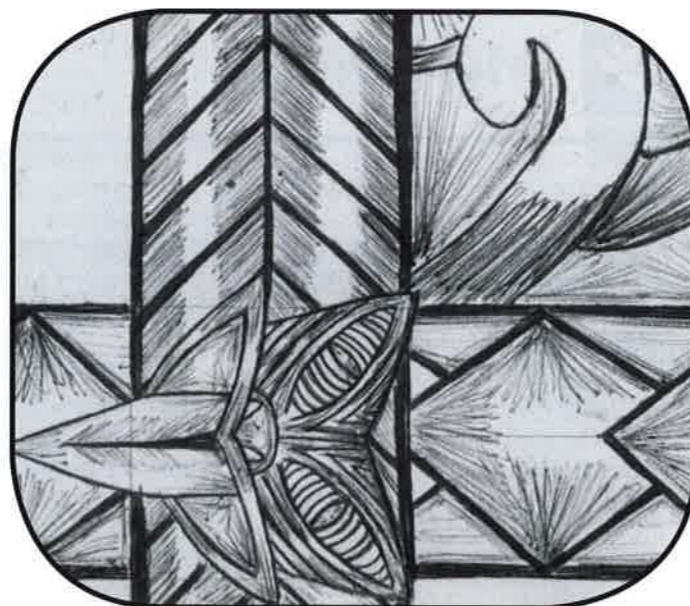

I would take it down to the creek and play songs, it was peaceful out there. That's why I don't like reading her letters, too many memories. I want to see her but I can't. I just can't, not now anyway.

16.4.04

I finally opened mum's letter. I couldn't stand looking at it, not knowing what she wanted to say. She died, Mum died. A slow painful death. I guess it was from smoking. Mum began smoking heavily when dad died, it was her way of coping with his death and keeping him off her mind. She missed him a lot, she tried to hide it from us kids but I knew it. Every time I looked in her eyes, I saw how lost she felt.

Mum's funeral is next week, back home in Whangaroa. I don't know if I'm going though, I want to but after what I did to mum I think it's best that I not. It's hard adjusting to this, my mum dead. She was a strong lady, looking after us wild kids, despite all of this she still loved us.

19.4.04

I feel guilty for the way I treated mum, all the pain and stress I caused her, acting like a selfish spoiled little brat, I had everything in the world. Being the only girl in the family, having brothers who stood up for me and a mother who supported and loved me no matter what.

She helped get me into teachers training college, I don't think she wanted me to go but she helped me anyway, talking to so and so who was president of the Maori Women's Welfare League, and to so and so who was with the Maori Affairs. Now that this has happened I realise how much she really means to me. I don't know why I never realised this earlier.

21.4.04

Mum's death has really gotten to me. There's this place somewhere in my body that feels totally lost. I guess somewhere in there, I just realised now. I feel bad for the way I treated her, now showing her the respect and love she truly deserved. There's so much I want to say to her. Firstly, I want to apologise, apologise for my wrong doings and let her know that I left for my own reasons and that it's not her fault. Nothing was her fault. Since finding out about mum's death, I'm unable to sleep peacefully every time I close my eyes I see her, standing there before me, smiling. When I see her I want to apologise. These dreams have also made me see better in myself. I'm going to mum's funeral, to send her off properly and say what I never said before.

24.4.04

The bus ride was long and stuffy, a 5 hour boring long ride. Anyways I'm here now preparing my speech. There's so much I want to say but I don't know how. I want to tell her how much I miss and love her, I want to curl up in her arms and hug her but I just want to say sorry for all the pain I've caused. Somehow I know it won't be that easy to say.

27.4.04

We buried mum today. It was a beautiful heartfelt service celebrating her wonderful life. Man, I miss her. Hone and Tara gave their speeches, saying how she was always there for us and all. Fa was there too but stayed on the low at the back. Maki was placed in the front next to Uncle Roy and Aunt Aroha, to keep him company. He must be so confused, not knowing what's happening around him.

As I got up to say my speech tears overfilled my eyes, I tried my best to control it but by that time everything just came out "I miss you mum, I love you so much, I'm sorry. Sorry for everything I did to you. Sorry for being a little spoiled brat. Sorry I never listened to you. Sorry I always took things out on you. SORRY mum." Hone and Tara had to carry me off the stage, my tears overflowing my face. I sat at the back of the church after that, thinking of all the good things mum did for me, then I realised I never actually said what I wanted to say so I looked up to the sky, holding a lilac in my hand and said 'Mum I'm sorry, you are a beautiful, loyal, caring, loving mother and I am sorry I gave you so much slack. I hope that now you are happy and have found a beautiful place where you and dad can be together forever. I'm sorry mum. Rest in peace'.

29.5.04

I visited Mum's grave today it was beautiful, she was surrounded by all her favourite flowers, lilies, gardenia and lilacs, she would have loved it. Sitting here now and looking back on what's happened, I realise life is too short to be wasted. My mother and father are dead, Maki can't rely on himself, Fa is making the best of his life and as for Tara and Hone well I just don't know. Life goes on and that's what I got to do.

9.5.04

I did some hard thinking last night and I decided to go back to University. Because mum had supported and helped me get into teachers training college, I owe it to her go to back and complete my teacher's degree. Just think one day, I'll have a wonderful class, teaching in a small town. I'll be Miss Whakari, I like the sound of that. Tomorrow I will ring my lecturer and see if my position is still available. Hopefully it is.

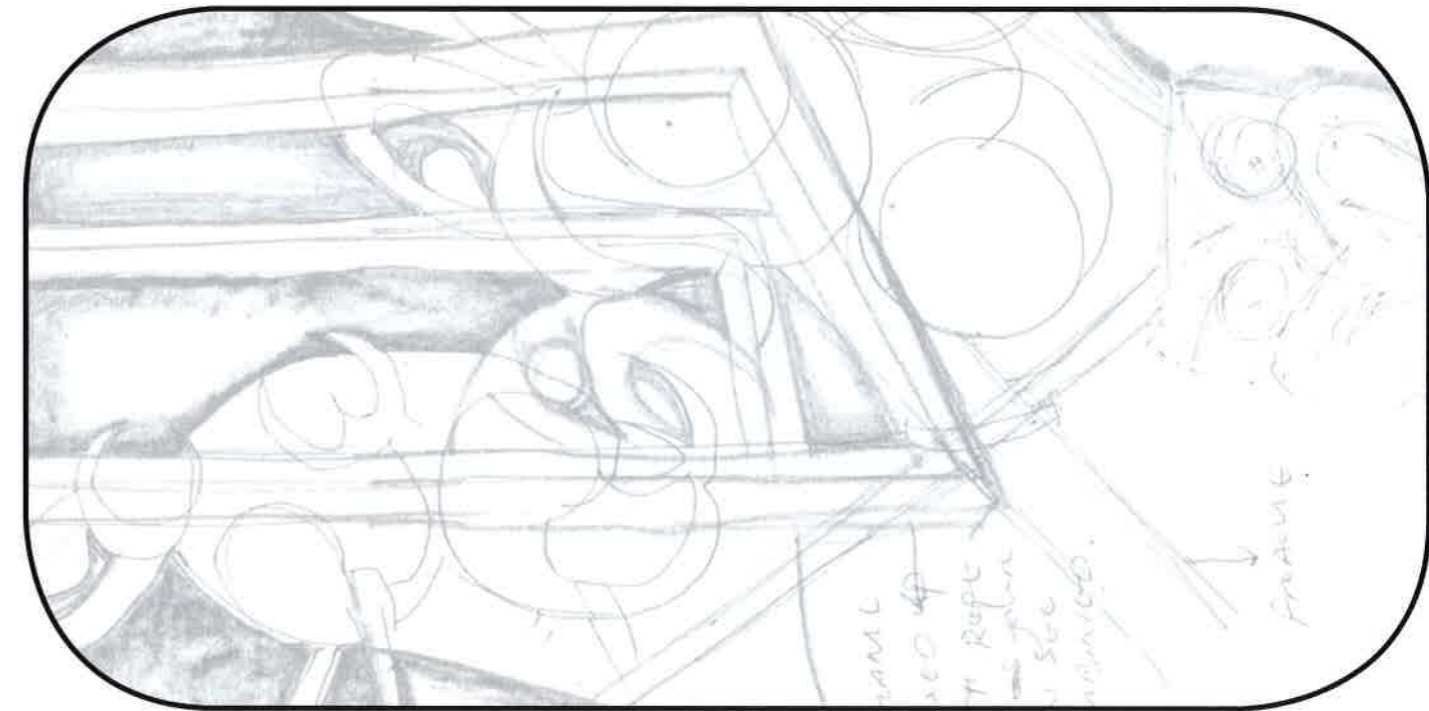

The student services centre team have used a strong multidisciplinary approach to working with and caring for our students this year. We are a family at MC and we look after each other. As a family we all need to talk to each other, be honest about who we are, discuss what our needs are and how we can help each other. This year the centre has developed more effective ways of communication with the school community by constructing a new web-page on the intranet, printing brochures in different languages, using e-mail more effectively and by increasing awareness through the daily bulletins and through our useful health displays. Good working relationships and a growing closeness to deans and our senior management team has meant that we have been more able to identifying students who have needs or problems and work more effectively to support them.

As a family, we have welcomed two new doctors to the team this year, Nua and Pauline, and we now offer three GP clinics per week, complementing the physiotherapist Helen who runs two clinics a week. Judith, our full-time nurse, also became ACC registered, making it possible for our clinic to give wider and more specialised treatments. This ensures that students receive full care – from serious sports injuries to personal health issues. We have also welcomed two student counsellors, Jo and Silas, who have fitted in very well and have really got alongside some of our young people.

2005 has been an excellent year both for new programme development and improving what we already do. We see it as really important to work with our students and their families through Student and Maori Mentoring, Student Health Council, the Peer Sexuality Support Group, Health Week and other ongoing groups such as Quit Smoking and Project X. The Student health Council has been particularly active and we congratulate them and look forward to seeing their efforts rewarded next year with a Silver Heartbeat Award! Project X also provides a good example of what can be achieved when our students, staff and the community work together.

Sadly we have to say goodbye to George Filo, our student mentor, who after four years is cutting loose to even greater things and to Lorraine Mitchell, part-time nurse, who is also leaving to take up a position at KidzFirst. To both of you we say "Thanks and good luck!!" and, as with all families, come back and see us any time (and bring morning tea!).

In 2006 we will be welcoming a new member of our team who will be working as a social worker. This is a new position and we are excited about providing more support to our families through this role and further strengthening our relationships with the community. Next year we look forward to working with you! The Student Services Centre has lots to offer our students and families, so don't be shy about asking us questions or supporting your friends to get the advice or support they need.

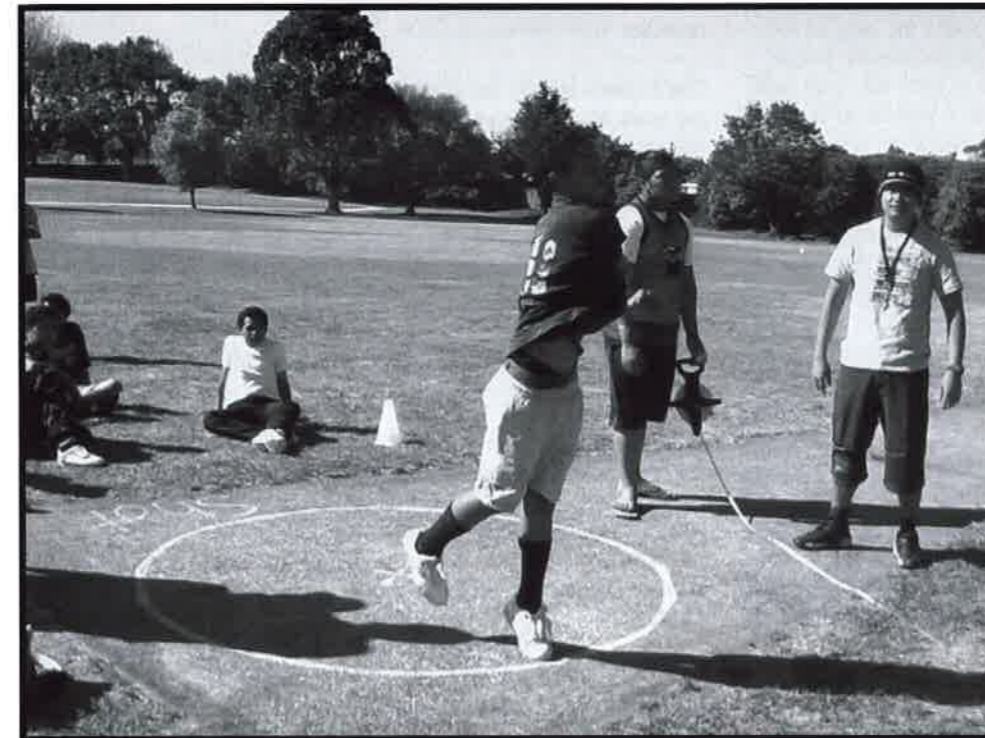

It was the time of netball this began with enormous number of girls who were interested in playing for the school netball team. These girls anticipated many things especially when playing for the first time in the secondary netball competition.

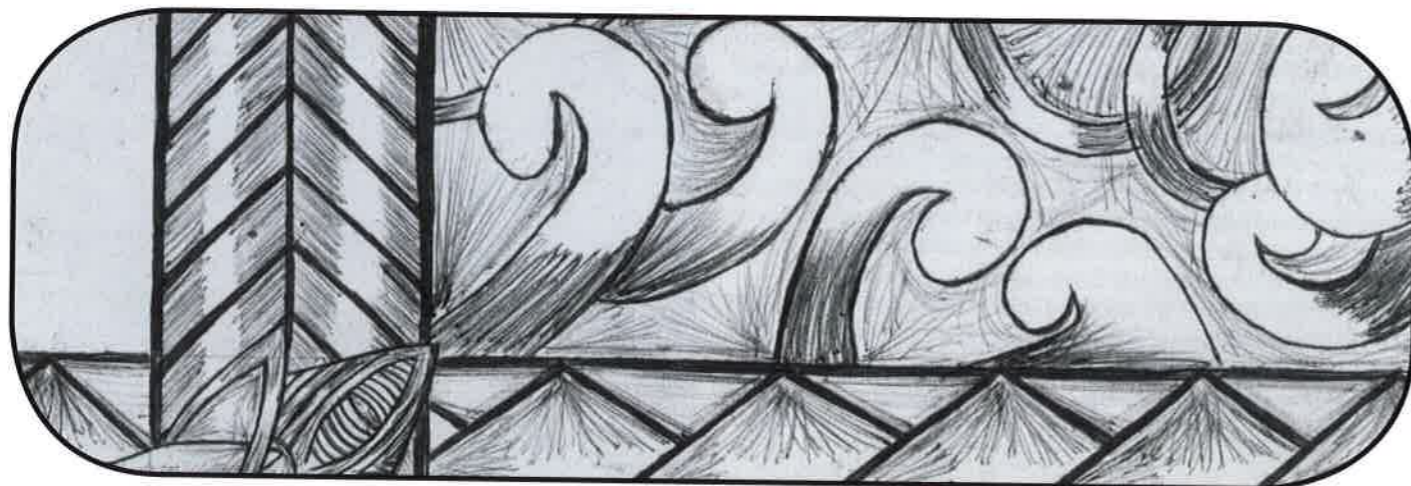
