

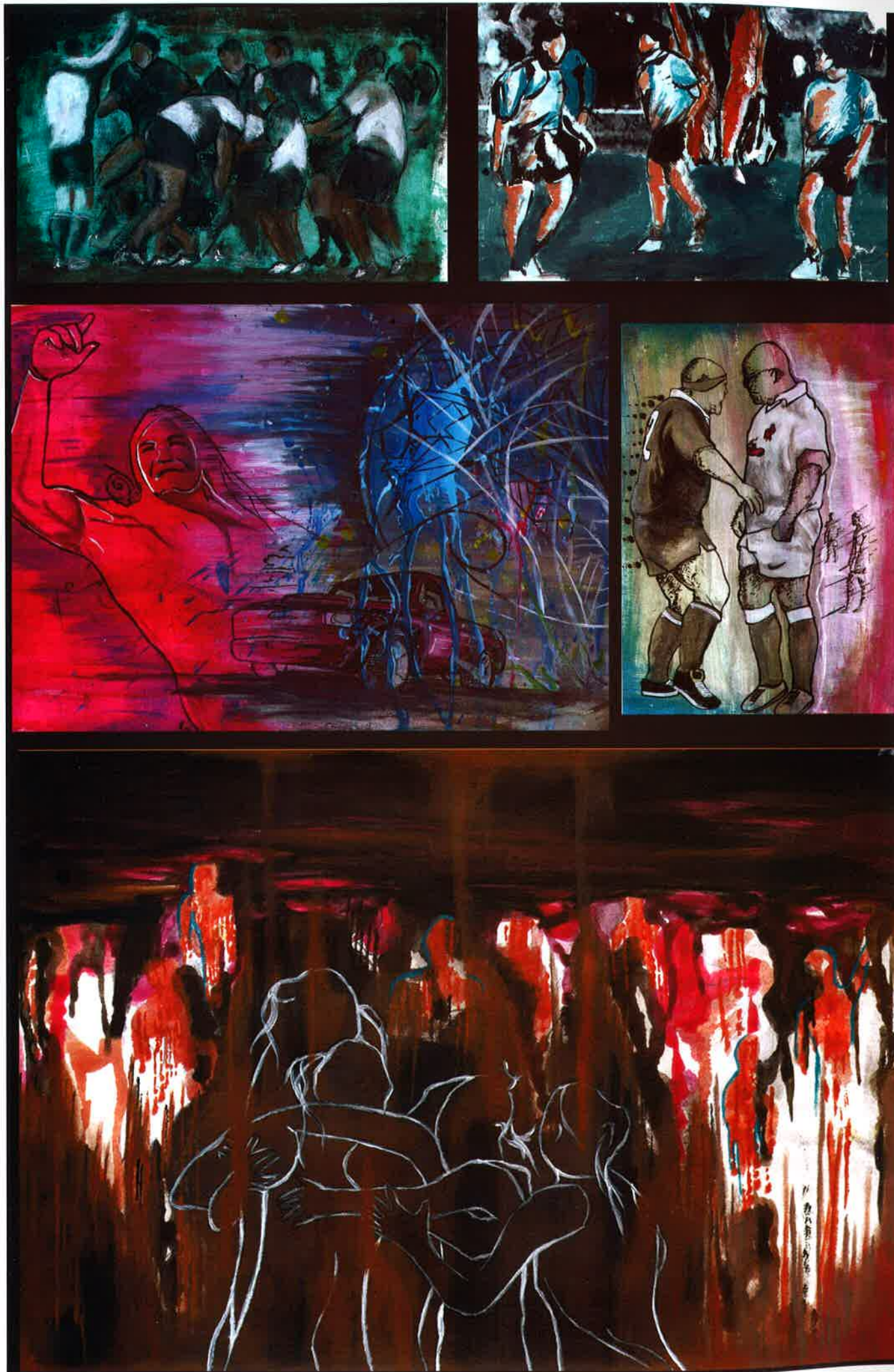

The Principal's Report

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to present my annual report for 2011. This year has seen the college roll continue to grow and one consequence of this growth in roll is the fact that finally we have been able to complete the scheduled new building work. At the beginning of this year we were delighted to be able to use the refurbished classrooms in the auditorium. In the middle of Term 3 we opened the new languages classrooms and, at the time of writing in late Term 4, we are looking forward to the juniors being able to enjoy our new gym. We are also ready to embark on the refurbishment of D Block in 2012.

We are particularly proud of our Languages classrooms for, as the MP for Mangere, Su'a William Sio commented as he declared the languages' classrooms open, there cannot be many schools with a dedicated teaching block to Māori, Samoan, Tongan, and Cook Islands Māori.

In Term 1 of this year we were pleased to report on the academic achievements of our 2010 cohort: We were particularly pleased that last year's year 11 achieved a 67.4% achievement rate in the Literacy and Numeracy requirements at Level 1 and I know that many of the students that just missed this requirement at the end of last year have succeeded in completing it over the course of this year.

These results also place a challenge in front of this year's year 11 for them to better this achievement in the future and we need to achieve this in the face of the re-alignment of the NZQA standards that are taking place. Once again our year 13 cohort in 2010 achieved a 100% completion of a national certificate, and from the Ministry Benchmark data the percentage of our Pasifika school leavers leaving with a year 12 Qualification now stands at 70.5%.

We were also very pleased with how well the academic counselling at Year 11 was received by both students and their families. As a consequence of this we have decided to apply academic counselling to the entire senior school in 2012.

In the junior school our use of the e-asTTle assessment tool has allowed us to monitor our work on the literacy and numeracy needs of our students;

and also allowed us to recognise the strides that our students make over the course of their junior schooling – in particular it gives me a great deal of pleasure to report that in literacy Year 9 progressed 3 sublevels over the course of the year, compared to the national movement of 1 sub level, and Year 10 moved one sub level, in keeping with the national average. However at Year 10 we were delighted to notice that our students in the lowest quartile progressed 3 sub levels.

And the achievements of 2011 go far wider than just academic success. In sport 2011 has been one of remarkable success at regional representation with the following students who have achieved sporting representation at a level beyond school –
In year 13 Falaniko Tuliau and Mamia Opu'u in rugby and volleyball respectively. In year 12 Angelcrystal Lavea and Isi Tuungafasi gained rep status in rugby and Crystal Ng Lam and Naomi Urika gained rep status in volleyball. In year 11 Foyalalo loasa gained rep status in volleyball. At year 10 Victor Tu'ungafasi in Rugby and Leonard Smith-Flavell in the Waikato U20 Men's Tag team, and in Rugby League: Abraham Ngametuango Vaipa'ata, Quinn Ma'aelopa, and Nathan Strickland. At Year 9 Steven Taupau, Pua Samani and Puna Teraitua in Rugby.

And at National level this year Lafu Tavila of year 11 was selected for the U16 New Zealand Rugby League team.

But the college's sporting achievement goes much deeper than these students and again we need to see the achievements of our sporting codes in 2011 as drawing on the grounding and development in the respective sports that our school offers.

Our Sports Awards evening at the end of last term saw us acknowledge this depth of sporting talent within the college and out of that evening I wish to highlight the following team achievements:

- Southern zone Senior Boys Touch Rugby 3rd in zone
- Southern zone Junior Girls Touch Rugby 2nd in zone
- Southern zone mixed touch team 1st in zone
- Boys' Basketball 1st in U19 Bowl

- Girls' Rugby 10's 1st in Plate Final
- 1st XV Rugby 4th in 1B Championship
- U19 Girls' Basketball 4th in U19 Championship
- Year 10 Netball 2nd in Championship
- Junior Girls volleyball 4th at North Island championships, and 2nd in Auckland championships
- U14 Rugby 1st in U14B Championship
- Girls' soccer 1st in Senior Championship
- Premier girls' volleyball 1st in Auckland Championships

And as I said at our Sports Awards evening in late Term 3 these achievements are the result of the school, families and our community working together to support our talented sporting students.

In this year's Polyfest we were proud of the way that every group performed with such pride and passion and had much pleasure when once again our Cook Island group were named as Champions.

The Music Department has also enjoyed success with our music students, and I wish to highlight the achievements of the college jazz group that travelled to Tauranga to take part in the National Jazz Festival. The results were superb with Valerie Fasavalu of year 12 named as Best Vocalist, Sarah Pikaahu named as Most Outstanding pianist, and the whole band winning gold and being named as the Best First Year Band Performance.

I also want to thank those staff who have left or are leaving us at the end of this year:

- Ms Kim leaves us at the end of the year to travel overseas;
- Ms Zainy whose contract has come to an end;
- Mrs Diaz resigned at the end of Term 3 to spend more time with her family;
- Ms Latif resigns at the end of this year to explore new challenges in 2012;
- Ms McGrath retires at the end of this year and we wish her a happy and peaceful retirement;
- Ms Fa'avagaga goes on maternity leave,
- Ms Wilkins leaves us to take up a position at Baradene College, and
- Mr Ah Sam leaves us to take up a position at Victoria University of Wellington.

I thank all these staff for their work with our students and wish them every success in the years ahead.

I now look forward to 2012 – the refurbishment of D block will prove to be challenging for us and will need to be a staged project, but we can all look forward to the time when the whole block will be complete.

And remember our motto of Seek the Heights is not just for school but for every part of your lives.

The past year has seen some very significant developments in the School. Because of our strong roll growth, we are able to build a new gym and additional classrooms.

The new classrooms are dedicated as a Languages Block and as such will be a great asset to Mangere College for many years to come. Principal John Heyes, along with the architects have put a lot of thought into the design of this facility. The overall design blends in well with the existing buildings. They have been built with flexibility in mind to service differing situations and needs. What a contrast this is to the appearance of the School 15 years ago, when the block walls were unpainted. Yes, it took 25 years before they got their first coat of paint.

It is hoped that the students will acquire a love of growing, but more importantly, they will be much more aware of the type of healthy foods that they should be enjoying.

In closing, I reiterate the importance of people to Mangere College; the Board, Principal, Staff, Students, and Parents that make up the family of Mangere College.

Having been brought up overseas for almost my entire life, I don't find it difficult to relate to most of you who were born and raised here in New Zealand. Although my Tongan isn't at a standard that I would prefer, I can admit that there is one thing our Tongan language gives me, and that is a sense of identity. Our Tongan language and way of thinking are embodied in our culture, and unlike many cultures, the Tongan culture exists in our everyday lives, in both formal and informal gatherings, whether we congregate at church or hangout in the park. When we speak our language, we are living our culture and showing off our identity as Tongans. This is something to be proud of but also something we shouldn't take lightly. If one thinks about it, the loss of one's language leads to the loss of one's identity, and what makes us unique from any other group of people in the world.

I find that there is a certain unique quality about the Tongan youth here in New Zealand compared to the Tongan Diaspora in Australia, America & elsewhere. You've been able to adapt our Tongan language & way of thinking to today's modern world.

Our language and culture is forever adjusting to

Tongan values and was one of the most memorable events during this historical event. As long as we remember, and try our best to uphold our Tongan values, we will always be remembered in the world.

Our language & culture is something we can take with us everywhere we go and can be a source of pride, pride in the fact that every time you speak Tongan you are paying tribute to your parents, grandparents and ancestors. You pay tribute to Tongans that have come before you, and you set a standard for future generations follow. You are vital to the continuation of our language, identity and Tongan way of thinking. Every little thing you do affects that...no pressure or anything! But you are the future of our language & culture, if you ignore it, there isn't anyone else who will care enough to continue our Tongan legacy. I leave those thoughts with you students & wish you all the best with your studies!

May God be glorified in us all this day and always.

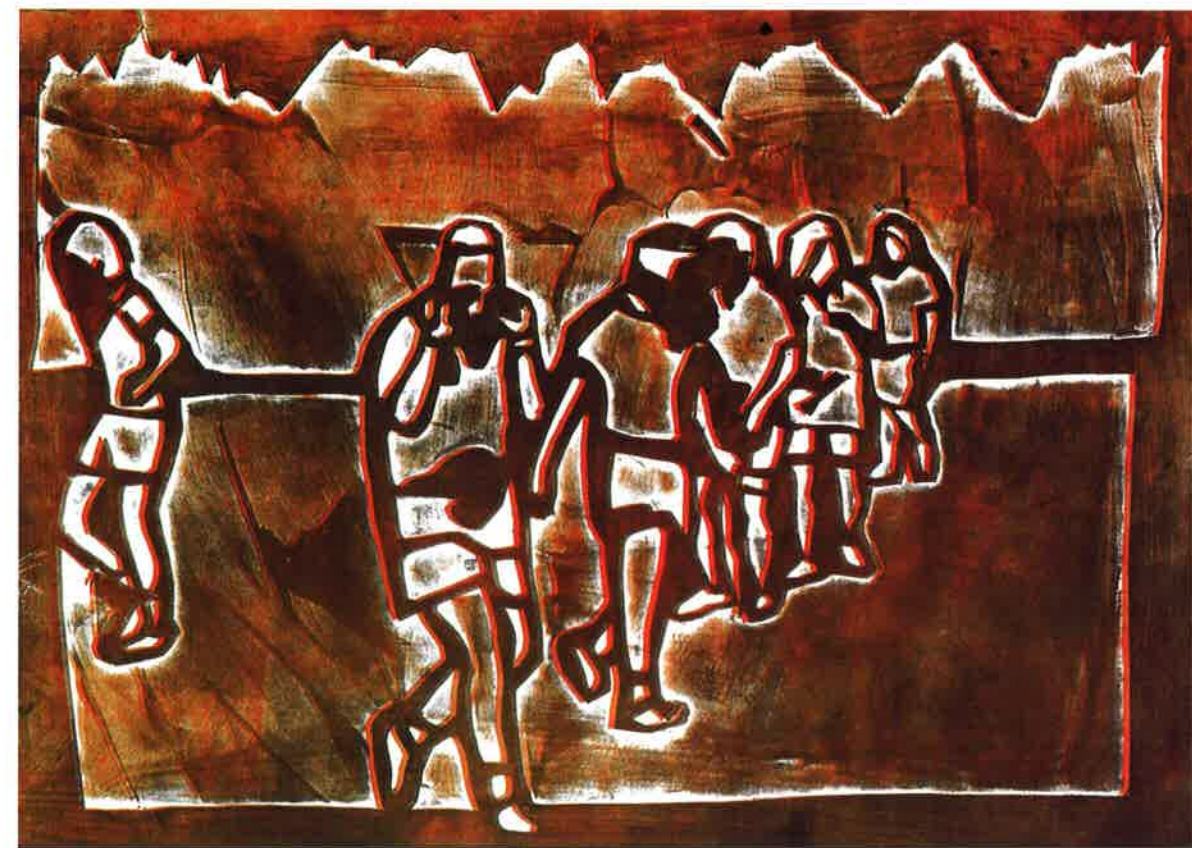
We all went in as trainee mediators and came out as experienced peer mediators and good friends

Ruta Koleti Savea, was born to parents Tavita and Leleaga Savea on the 25th of December, 1940 in the village of Lalomalava, located in Savai'i, Samoa. She never got hidings from her parents and hardly ever got smacks at school because she was so obedient. She always did her chores and was soon spoiled by her grandmother. Ruta's family, like most samoan families, was very religious. They were Presbyterian and went to church every Sunday. They also said prayers and sang songs to the lord every evening.

Although she seemed like the perfect child, Ruta wasn't destined for an easy life. Her father left the family for another woman when she was about 8 years old. Her mother was left to care for them and life was tough. But, when Ruta was 12 years of age, an even worse tragedy occurred. Her mother passed away. Ruta and her siblings were devastated. And to make things worse, Ruta's father refused to go to the funeral. Ruta's remaining family were sent to live with their mother's sister, Leu, who was nearby. She then adopted Ruta and her siblings.

Ruta was shattered by everything that had happened, but did not let these tragedies keep her down. She worked tremendously hard at school, and passed all her exams. By this time she was at the end of her intermediate years and one of her teachers offered her a scholarship to go to a Seven Day Adventist school in Upolu, and because the family was low on money, they couldn't refuse. So her aunty sent her to live with another aunty in Fugalei, Upolu, while her younger siblings stayed and finished intermediate. She went to the college and started doing very well, but she wouldn't be staying in that college for very long. Her scholarship ended after 4th form, when the teacher that gave the scholarship to her was transferred to Australia and could no longer pay for her fees. Her family in Savai'i struggled to pay for school, so Ruta left college in 5th form to find a job and support them.

One of Ruta's uncles decided that she should go to live with him so she moved in with him in the village of Toamoa, Upolu. After looking for a job for a few months, she found one in working at Aggie Grays hotel. Of course she was working to support her uncle that she was living with, but she secretly

saved some money to give to her aunty Leu in Savai'i. She occasionally was given time off her job and she visited her aunty to hand deliver the money. Ruta enjoyed working at the hotel, but after one year her uncle told her to go help out a friend of his and work at his supermarket. Ruta, being as obedient as she was, couldn't refuse. She took up the job at the supermarket but continued to save money to hand-deliver to her Aunty in Savai'i.

Ruta had probably met a lot of people working at the supermarket, but there was one man in particular that would change her life. When Ruta was about 21 years old, she met Pelenatino Fuga through her nephews. He was a fisherman and a farmer, and brought food to the markets. Ruta's whole family knew the man well so they were happy when the two started seeing each other. Ruta worked at the supermarket for 2 years. Ruta and Pelenatino decided to get a house of their own, so Pelenatino got some of his friends and renovated a house in Si'ufaga Falelatai. Ruta moved into the house when she was 22. Pelenatino was providing all the money selling fish at the markets, and grew a big plantation full of food. Soon after they had their first children, Ilalio in 1963, and Surita in 1965.

Religion was another huge influence in Ruta's life and a factor that delayed her marrying the father of her children - he was Catholic. She continued to attend her own church and took her children with her for some years while the rest of the family attended the Catholic services. She felt the need for some unison and attend one service together as a family and therefore Ruta wanted to know everything there was to learn of Pelenatino's Catholic religion before she would convert. Her family wasn't exactly happy with this decision. They were all angry, but her grandmother was furious. She did not support her at all in switching to another religion. Despite her family's disapproval Ruta continued to study the religion for three years. When she felt sure and ready she and Pelenatino got married in 1966, at the Fetuao Catholic Church. She accepted her partner's surname, Fuga. The couple later had two more kids, Malia in 1967 and Setefano in 1969.

Pelenatino continued to work to support the family until his sister suggested he and the family migrate to NZ, so he flew over alone to check it out. After 3 months he travelled back to Samoa.

After discussion, the couple decided to immigrate to NZ with the kids to provide them with better opportunities. When they arrived in Auckland, they stayed at one of Pelenatino's brothers' house, in Onehunga. Pelenatino was already working and saving money but Ruta had to stay home with

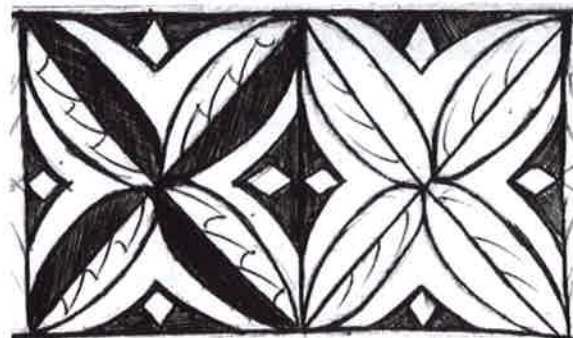
Setefano until he was old enough to go to school. She then found a job at W.H. Bond Company.

The couple finally put aside enough money to rent a house in Te Papa and later a rental house in Mangere East, before finally buying their own home in the same area. They both continued to work, Ruta for Gillette, and Pelenatino for Winstone wallboards, and they finally managed to pay off their mortgage.

Life from there was pretty much straight forward. Ruta was made redundant in 1999, and decided to retire early at the age of 59 due to illnesses and injury. Since then, at her family's request, she became one of the high chiefs of the family and reluctantly accepted all the responsibilities that came with the title. As a gesture of love, Ruta adopted her late sister's son and daughter, who were still under the age of 18. She celebrated her 70th birthday in 2010 at Lake Rotoma, Rotorua with her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. She is currently living in Mangere East with her oldest son and her niece, as her husband passed away in 2004.

In my eyes, my nana is one of the most caring people you'll ever meet, and I know that saying is clichéd, but that's probably the best way to describe her. If she won the lottery, she would probably give most of it away to those who need it. She is the epitome of what it means to care for others, especially your family. She is loving, kind, generous, humorous, and contains all the wonderful qualities that make her who she is. She has instilled many values in us all and is a huge positive on everyone. My nana is truly a gift – that's why she was born on Christmas day.

MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

This year we welcomed two new staff: Mr Lotulelei and Mrs Chadha into the Department. Mr Lotulelei was appointed as the new HOD. The department recognises the importance of Literacy in students' learning and has fully supported the school's Secondary Literacy Project (SLP) by having its own staff becoming members of the SLP. The respective deans have given advice and support too. The teacher aides are providing one to one support in some classes and a full roster of teacher aides has been scheduled to work alongside teachers of these students throughout the year.

The department's main goals for this year were the full implementation of the new alignment of Achievement Standards in Year 11 Courses and the creation of new courses using new alignment Achievement Standards for NCEA Level 2 in 2012. Teachers have had on-going support and professional development on using technology, literacy strategies in teaching and the implementation of the New Zealand Curriculum new alignment Achievement Standards in NCEA Levels 1 and 2.

The NCEA results from the past three years have indicated steady and consistent trends compared to National. The 2010 Level 1 Numeracy achievement rate was 89.5% compared to 79.6% in 2009 and were both above the National average. However, a careful approach is required in 2012 as the Numeracy success rate may drop due to the full

implementation of the new alignment of Achievement Standards replacing all expired Achievement and Unit Standards.

The 2010 NCEA Level 1 results, students had gained the highest number of Merit grades ever but gained fewer Excellence grades than 2009. The students' achievements in the NCEA Level 2 External Standards were the highest since the inception of NCEA and were 19% more than the National average. The highest number of Merit and Excellence grades ever gained in a single year.

First Foundation Scholarships

The First Foundation aims to assist academically talented and financially disadvantaged students to achieve their potential through tertiary education and to prepare them to positively influence and benefit their communities.

In order to do this the First Foundation arranges scholarships for selected students with leading New Zealand companies. 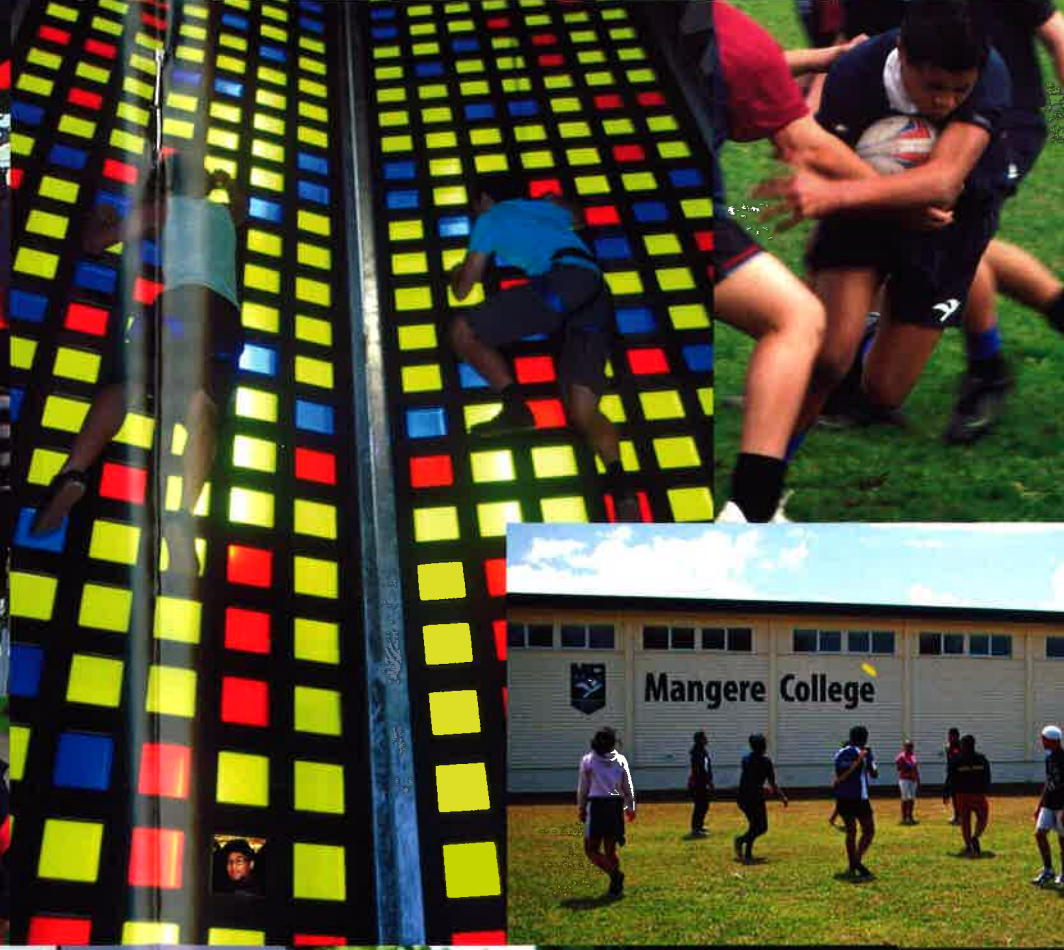

The coaching staff and management named Gelling Viniki Most Valuable Player and the Most Improved Player was Patric Tulafasa.

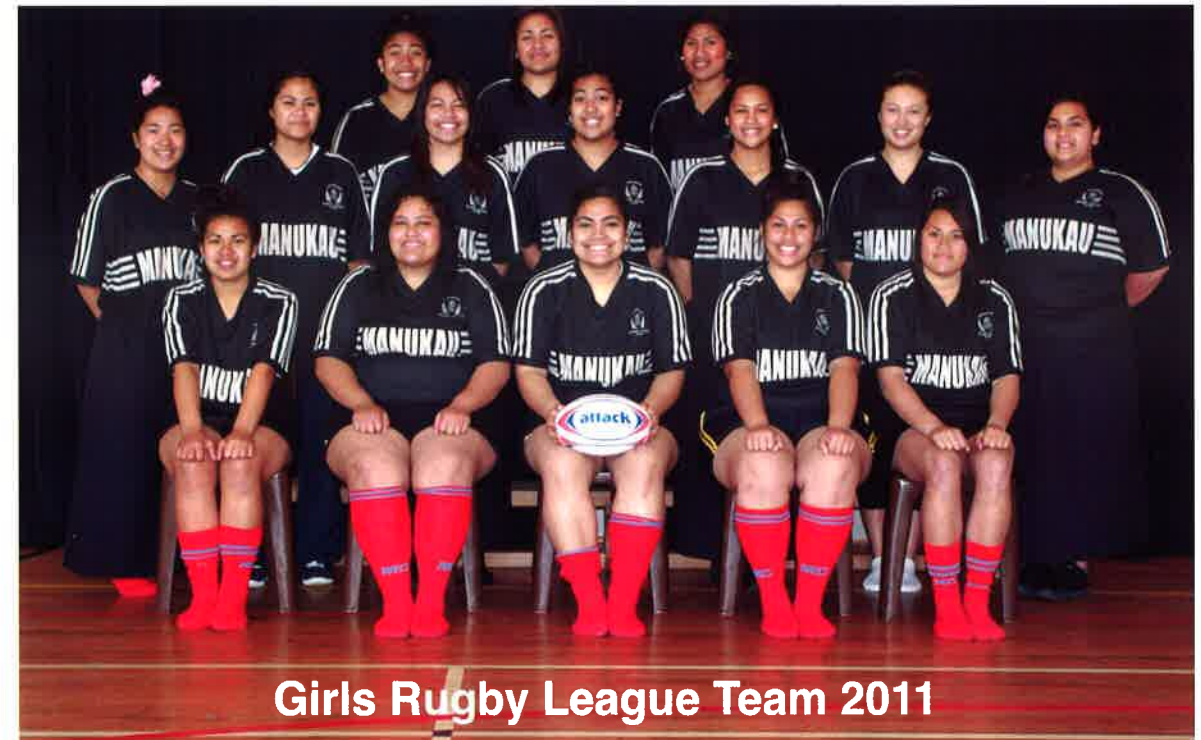

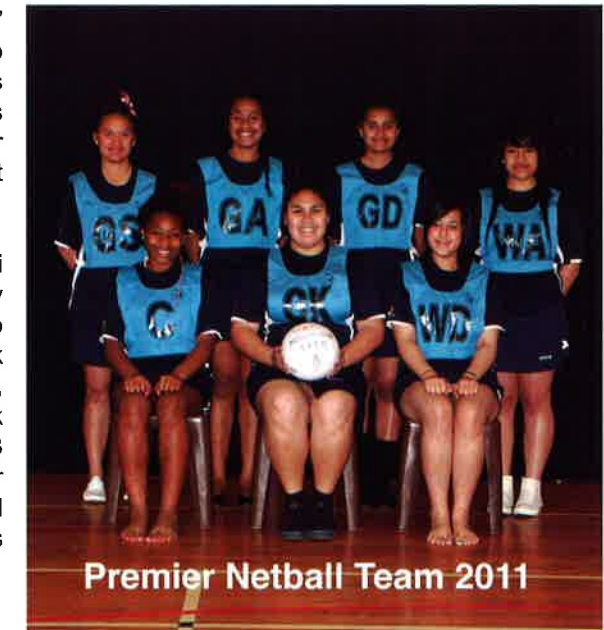

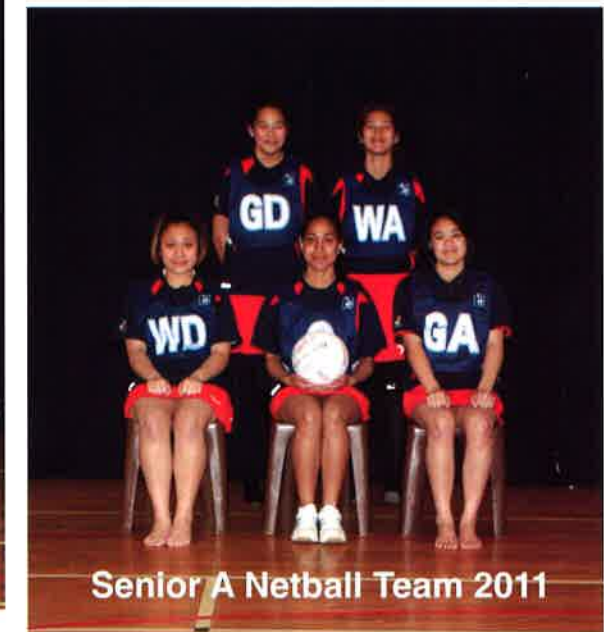

Being in the finals was nerve-racking but we fought our hearts out to win and we hope we did our school proud. It was such a wonderful experience and having the title once again was blissful.

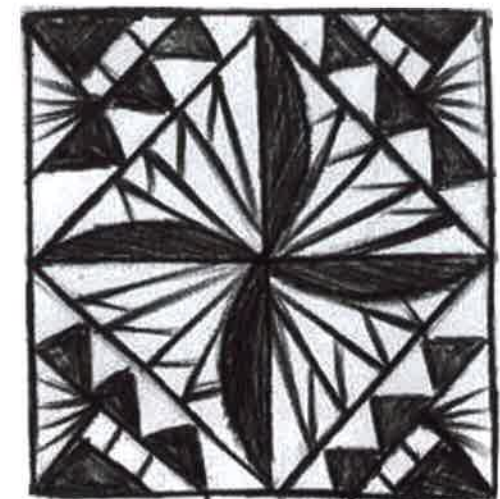

With a total of 4 wins, 1 loss and 1 draw we managed 4th place overall. This was a good result to a great season. We wish all the best to our year 13 students

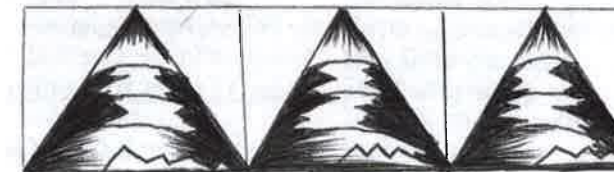

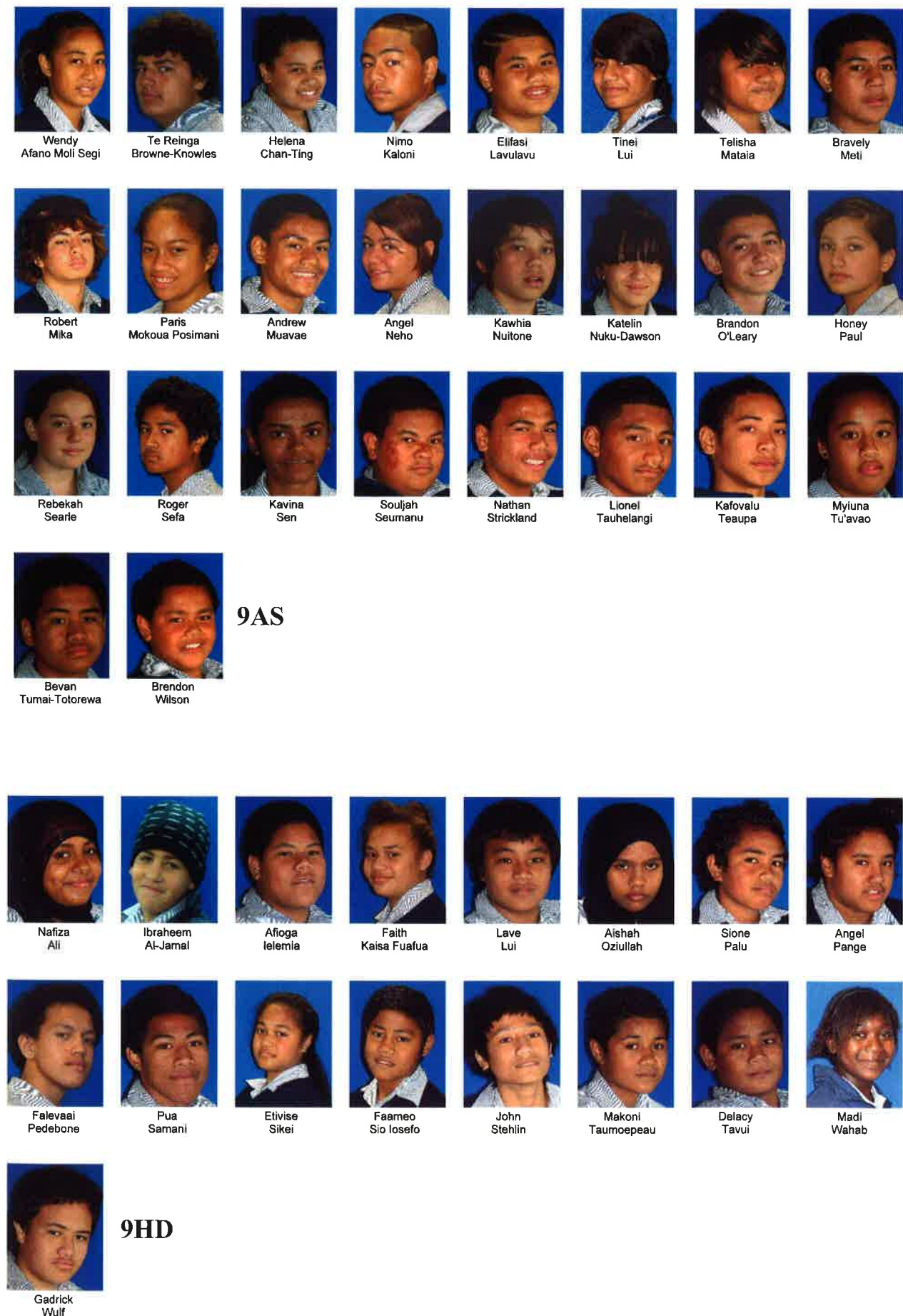

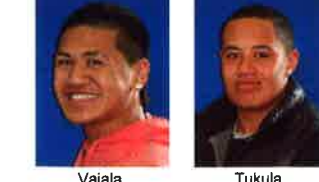
