
Distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen, and of course to the students of Mangere College. It is a great honour to stand here before you to talk about the importance of our Tongan language and the

Our Tongan language and way of thinking are embodied in our culture, and unlike many cultures, the Tongan culture exists in our everyday lives, in both formal and informal gatherings, whether we congregate at church or hangout in the park. When we speak our language, we are living our culture and showing off our identity as Tongans. This is something to be proud of but also something we shouldn't take lightly. If one thinks about it, the loss of one's language leads to the loss of one's identity, and what makes us unique from any other group of people in the world.

I find that there is a certain unique quality about the Tongan youth here in New Zealand compared to the Tongan Diaspora in Australia, America & elsewhere. You've been able to adapt our Tongan language & way of thinking to today's modern world.




Setefano until he was old enough to go to school. DESERT LIFE She then found a job at W.H. Bond Company.

One day I asked him a question:


"What do people see in you?"





First Foundation Scholarships

The First Foundation aims to assist academically talented and financially disadvantaged students to achieve their potential through tertiary education and to prepare them to positively influence and benefit their communities.

In order to do this the First Foundation arranges scholarships for selected students with leading New Zealand companies. A First Foundation scholarship provides a student with \$12,000 towards their fees for the first 3 years at university, paid part-time work (with their scholarship partner) for 4 years, a mentor to advise them and act as an advocate and supporter, and a support and development programme to assist them to transition into tertiary training.
