The Principal's Report

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to present my address at this prizegiving where we celebrate the final year of achievement for this year's Year 13.

Over your years at MC you have grown into young adults and while you may not have realised it at the time, the college has also grown. On the building side of things when you walked into this auditorium in 2009 as year 9 students the refurbishment of the Admin Block had just been completed at the beginning of that year, at the beginning of 2010 you saw the refurbished pool changing rooms, gym changing rooms and the refurbishment of H Block was completed, in 2011 you witnessed the development of the auditorium classrooms A1 and A2, and as the year progressed we opened the Languages block and completed the building of the top gym. In 2012 we built the new carpark at the end of T block and began the first stage of the refurbishment of D block. And this year we completed Stage 1 of the D Block refurbishment. repainted the T block toilets and refurbished the Learning Support Centre. Just like each one of you MC does not stand still and we are constantly looking at improvement and this improvement is seen in both your academic development and the quality of the college environment.

This year the NZ government made it quite clear that they saw NCEA Level 2 as the main leaving qualification for school leavers. The government has stated that by 2017 they expect 85% of all 18 year olds to have achieved this qualification. We agree that the main school leaving qualification should be the Level 2 certificate, at

the same time we also recognise that underpinning this should be the fact that each student has a clear idea of their career pathway. We take a great deal of pleasure that all of our senior students, through the Academic Counselling sessions, have their career pathways thought out whether they be tertiary academic or into a trades' career, and we will recognise all these endeavours this afternoon.

We should remember what the Education Review Office said about our work

in Careers Education:

The school's provision of career services is a strength of the curriculum. Careers staff work with form teachers, deans and curriculum managers to help students make appropriate course decisions. Careers education is woven through the curriculum as a result of high quality planning and reporting. School leavers are individually monitored and tracked in association with external transition services...

And as we have very good retention in the senior school we know that the students sitting in this auditorium this afternoon have been well served in their preparation for the future, whether it be into the tertiary academic world, or into the trades.

The other aspect of education that has been in the news is the way that the government has set up charter schools, or as they now want to call them partnership schools. The main concern that we have about this is that state funding for education is being used to set up these schools. In other words the state education system has had money taken away in order to support these schools. I also believe that families need to be very careful about making choices to send children to a partnership school as I am sure that there will be all sorts of claims made about these schools but I do not think that partnership schools will be able to say: that all their staff are NZ registered teachers. I also do not believe that these partnership schools will be able to offer a full range of co-curricular activities - including a number of both summer and winter sports, itinerant music lessons, a full range of pasifika cultural groups, dance and drama clubs, and regular weekly afterschool homework sessions.

These partnership schools will not have a current student sitting on their governing board, and they will not have a fully staffed Student Services Centre that meets all health, social and guidance needs of all students.

About the only point of difference that a partnership school may be able to make is that the range of students attending may be more selective than is the case in a main stream state school. But again families need to be careful that they are not taken in by this, as the world is not a selective place, and in order to succeed in tomorrow's world all school leavers will have to develop the skills to relate to people from all walks of life - and these skills do not necessarily get developed when students are taught in a At the same time we know that our work with selective environment.

In our September newsletter I placed a copy of a letter that we had received from the Manukau Institute of Technology that congratulated us on a number of our senior students and I would like to repeat an extract from this letter now as it demonstrates some of these skills that we consider to be vital for senior students to

(your students) have been well mannered, well presented, well-spoken and considerate. A number of them have offered me help at various points of the day, unprompted. They have treated the lecturers, other students and myself with respect and consideration.

It is skills such as these that students develop in main stream schools that allow them to function in the modern world.

I also still have concerns about the way that Primary Schools are delivering the National Standards in education. The reliability of the data and the comparability of the data from primary school to primary school remains very variable and I believe that our colleagues in the primary service still have a way to go with their systems of moderation both internally and externally before their data will be of much use to us in secondary schools. It would have been a good idea if the government had resourced the primary service to achieve this moderation work just as they did for the secondary service as we bedded in the NCEA instead of using state education funds to set up charter schools.

NCEA assessment has withstood the test of time and provides our school leavers with a meaningful set of nationally moderated reports.

Last year I also urged parents and the community to become more critical as they looked at all school results. I asked you to consciously ask the question: "Please tell me what the achievement of Māori and pasifika students is?" As you know we also ask this question of ourselves and the work that we did this year shows that once again pasifika and Maori students achieved better at MC than at many other schools.

And the achievements of the year 13 of 2013 go far wider than just academic success. Some of the sporting highlights for this year are:

Board Chair's Report

"We know that great teaching and learning goes on in our schools, but having modern learning environments just makes the whole process of raising achievement for all our young people that much easier."

Minister Hekia Parata 03 November 2013

When I first joined the Board of Trustees of Mangere Collegein 1990's, the buildings were below average, with concrete walls still unpainted. We did have "great teaching and learning" though, through a dedicated staff.

Over the years, we have vastly improved the appearance of our buildings into a "modern learning environment". However, as I travel around Auckland now, I see new Public Schools that are futuristic in comparison, with facilities we can only dream of, so once again we are disadvantaged in this regard. In



my view, having the most "modern learning environment" is far more important to schools such as ours, than it is to high decile schools.

Do we still have "great teaching and learning" at Mangere College? Absolutely! The staff is as dedicated as ever, and they have enthusiastically adopted new techniques to lift student achievements. "The whole process of raising achievement for all our young people," is always the first priority for the Board of Trustees.

The advent of Partnership (Charter) Schools needs to be addressed since it is widely known that they will be initially introduced in the two areas of government priority: South Auckland and Christchurch. The first five have been announced. There are two in South Auckland (Rise Up Academy, South Auckland Middle School), two in Northland (Te Kura Houra o Whangarei, Te Kura Houra Whangaruru). The fifth one will be in Albany (Vanguard Military School), which is hardly in an area of great need.

The School that is most relevant to Mangere College is the South Auckland Middle School ("targeted at Maori, Pasifika and low-socioeconomic students"), sponsored by Villa Education Trust for years 7-10. On 17 September the Ministry stated that it will be situated in Mangere. However, subsequent to that, it has been announced that this will now be at Manurewa, in the beautiful park like grounds of the former headquarters of Jehovah's Witnesses. The Ministry's initial evaluation of the Trust's application acknowledges that they "did not always demonstrate their competency in educating Maori and Pasifica students".

The total roll of all the Partnership Schools for 2014 is 370 by my count. The budget for 2014 is \$19M. This is not new money; the only way to finance this is to pare the grants of existing Schools. On a pro rata basis, this is thousands of dollars from Mangere College. Remember, these students are already being educated in the present system, so in effect they (the 370 students) are being given the privilege of a perceived better education at the expense of the rest.

Finally it has been reported that, "Charter schools would get money for set up costs and property funding that their private-sector backers would be able to keep if a school folded."

As chair of the BOT, I thank the members who have given so freely of their time. It has been a privilege to work with the Principal, Senior Managers and staff and I thank every one of them for their efforts in helping our students fulfil their potentials.

To the students who are leaving us, we wish them well in the next phase of their lives.

This year I have come to believe that trust is the most valuable gift. Be true to yourself and you will prosper. Never let anyone stop you from fulfilling your



We continued on to Saleaula where we witnessed the evidence of the Matavanu Volcano that errupted in 1905, then to Sato'alepai where we swam with the turtles. These were only some of the interesting and historical things we saw on our first day in Savai'i. We travelled around the island and stayed in the beautiful beach fales and five-star hotels enjoying great meals served by our kind hosts.

We returned to Upolu to complete the rest of our trip.

We visited the museums and we learned a lot from the history behind all of it. We visited the sliding rocks located in the outskirts of the city; Apia to the giant ocean trenches: To Sua and To Le Sua located on the South Eastern Coast of Upolu, all were just spectacular.

We visited Manono, which was another experience we will not forget, travelling by small motor boats from Upolu to Manono and seeing passengers on the boat fishing as we travelled. We could feel the cool winds and saw the beautiful views of Apolima and Savai'i. The walk around the island of Manono was very hot, but with the wind behind our backs, we were able to complete the walk in one hour and a half. The lunch provided after the walk was delicious.

We all enjoyed our time there and most importantly, we learned a lot by getting involved in cultural practices and experiencing the every-day life of our Samoan people.





A new venture this year was the introduction of Automotive Studies in partnership with MIT. Senior students have been working on cars, mobile engines, and car parts and have found it to be exciting and rewarding. This once again has provided another avenue for students to explore as a possible career pathway into the Motor Body trades.

Senior students also participated in contributing to the school's building maintenance by manufacturing, welding and installing the security gates in D Block.

Mathematics Department

The year 2013 has been another successful year for the department as we have accomplished new challenges and initiatives and have successfully achieved most of our departmental and individual goals. The Numeracy programme has been fully developed and successfully implemented to maintain the school pass rate trend in Numeracy. Over 90 percent of the junior students have improved their numeracy levels as shown by the end of year asttle results.

The level 3 courses consisting entirely of new level 3 Achievement Standards have been successfully implemented and reviewed for 2014. Teachers have had on-going support and professional development on using technology, literacy strategies in teaching in all levels.

Further a selected sample of year 9 and year 10 students were entered for the first time to compete in the Australian Mathematics Competition against students at their levels from other schools in New Zealand and throughout the world.



By the end of the first round the boys were playing with a confidence which was boosted when they had the pleasure of taking the Mangere Cup from Southern Cross for the first time in eight years.







Over the break in the season, we will be developing combinations that offer three or four attacking options in one action, making it more difficult for defences to determine our point of attack.

This team has been slowly building over the past three years, and is adding parts one piece at a time. The key has been to exercise patience and understand the overall vision of where we want to beat the top!

It remains a work in progress and will continue as boys choose volleyball as a priority sport during their time at Mangere College. Keep your eyes on this space!
