



The Principal's Report

It gives me a great deal of pleasure to present my thoughts on our 2014 academic year.

For the past five years Mangere College has worked alongside staff from the University of Auckland on the Starpath Project. Over these years we have worked hard to make sure that the data that we collect on students is both meaningful and useful to all of us.

Students and families have seen this most clearly in the use that we make of this data in our on-going Academic Counselling work and the Parent-Student-Teacher conferences that we hold each year. We want to ensure that all students come to realise the vital role that they play in their own learning and we now expect all students to maintain ownership of and accountability for their own learning. As teachers we want to see this being translated into increased student potential and into clear individualised student learning and career goals.

We also realise that the contemporary secondary school world can pose challenges for families and caregivers, as the experiences of school in the second decade of the 21st century are now quite different to those experienced in the last decades of the 20th century. And that is why our Parent-Student-Teacher conferences are so valuable, as they allow families to meet us face-to-face as we discuss how we may work together to allow each student to make a smooth journey towards their career goals.

And that is why we have valued the academic support that the University of Auckland has given us, as we have been able to draw on their research expertise to assist us in this work as we have developed the systems that we are now using.



I would like to think that all senior students have grown in confidence in their journey towards their lives beyond secondary school. This year we have seen evidence of this in the way that our students have demonstrated a determined progression towards their gaining of the necessary credits.

And at this point I also need to mention the support that the Ministry of Education has given our staff as we have refined the ways in which we look at and use the data that we collect. Consequently by the end of term 3 this year we were delighted to see that 67% of year 11 were already half way towards gaining a level 1

Certificate, with 28 students having gained more than 60 credits, 5 having gained more than 70 credits and one student who had already gained the necessary 80 credits for level 1.

For year 12 the story was similar, as they aimed for level 2; 65% of year 12 had already achieved more than 30 credits by the end of Term 3, with 19 students having gained more than 50 credits and 8 students who had already gained the necessary 60 credits for level 2.

And of course this achievement has continued in Term 4 and by Labour Weekend 72% of both year 11 and 12 were already over halfway towards gaining their respective certificates.

By the end of term 3 this year we were delighted to see that 65% of year 13 had already achieved more than 30 credits, with 25 students having gained more than 50 credits, 13 having gained more than the necessary 60 credits for Level 3.

In terms of the government's target for 85% of school leavers achieving level 2, I am pleased to report that by Labour Weekend 88% of this year's 13 had gained Level 2.

At the time of my writing we now look forward to these superb internal achievements being matched by similar high performances in the externals.

Term 2 of this year saw us work alongside the NZ Police and Presbyterian Support Services as we launched the It's not OK programme to the college and the college community. All along we had requested that our students be empowered to lead this work in saying no to family violence and we were delighted when so many students willingly offered to be ambassadors. The challenge for us all is to make sure that our work does not get lost as we move into 2015.

In Term 3 the college was proud to host the launch of the Lea Faka-tonga Achievement Standards. This became a wonderful celebration in our auditorium and once again our students played a central role in the ceremony. We were flattered to receive the following e-mail the day after from the Pasifika Education Coordinator at the Ministry of Education:

I would like to send our gratitude and appreciation for the Powhiri yesterday at the launch of the Lea Faka-

Tonga Achievement standards. I have been to many powhiri but yesterday at your school was one of the best that I had witnessed and had the honour to be part of. The acknowledgement of the other Pasifika languages in the powhiri showed the openness of the school ... to embracing the Lea faka-Tonga... Malo 'aupito and thanks so much for your support.

And the achievements of 2014 continued. Some of the sporting highlights for this year are:

Our volleyball teams again were forces to be reckoned with our Senior Girls team 1 placing 3rd in Division 1, our Senior Girls team 2 placing1st in Division 2 and our Senior Boys team 1 placing 2nd in Division 1. And in the Southern Zone Junior competition our Division 1 and Division 2 Boys teams both placed 3rd.

In the Southern Zone Secondary Schools Touch Rugby competition our Senior Boys team placed 4th and our Senior Mixed team Placed 1st. And then in the Auckland Secondary Schools Touch Rugby competition our Senior Mixed team Placed 3rd. And our junior boys team placed 1st in the Southern Zone and then went on to be runners-up in the Auckland Championship finals.

Our Basketball U19 Boys in the Counties Manukau U19 Boys placed 2nd in the Cup.

In netball our Year 10 netball team placed 3rd in their Championship competition.

In Rugby Union our 1st XV won a place in the 1B championship division where they placed 4th and our

Girls 12-a-side came a creditable 6th Place in the Auckland-wide competition. Our Under 15 Rugby team played in the challenging Auckland-wide under 15B competition and placed 5th.

The stand-out performance for this year has to go to our Rugby League boys who played in the Auckland Secondary Schools U85kg division and who ended up as Auckland Champions.

And on top of all this the college had the largest number of students ever winning sporting places beyond school teams: with 20 students gaining regional honours with 3 being reps in two sporting codes and 5 students becoming national sporting representatives, all of whom were acknowledged at our Sports Awards Evening. I also thank those staff for their service who are leaving us at the end of this year:



BOT chairperson's Report

It is with sadness that I acknowledge the passing of Mangere College's founding Principal Ivan Armstrong. He was a special man and a special Principal who set the tone and culture for Mangere College from the

In my report last year, I focussed largely on Partnership Schools. You should be aware that five such Schools were introduced to the system last year and that a further four are scheduled to open for the first term of 2015. I remind you that the budget for the five current Charter Schools, with a projected roll of under 400 students was \$19M which was to be funded from existing Educational spending, thus disadvantaging existing Schools.

How are these Charter Schools performing? Apparently four have shown strong progress. As to the fifth one, this was reported in the Herald on 03 December 2014:

"The school, on a farm 65km northwest of Whangarei, was one of five chosen after a lengthy selection process to prove privately-run, publicly-funded schools can work in New Zealand."

When problems including management infighting and serious health and safety issues such as bullying and drug use were revealed in June, the ministry said the school's issues were resolved or being resolved. But ongoing problems at the school include the quality of teaching, learning, management, leadership and student engagement. The school's roll was 47 last

month - well below its guaranteed minimum roll of 71 and the 61 students who started the year."

As a Board, we need to be always mindful of the needs and welfare of our students and I believe the Board has achieved great things over the years. Good policies are in place and they are constantly reviewed. The result is that academic standards have been steadily rising, and with plans and goals already set, they will continue to improve.

We are midway between Board of Trustees elections. I have tendered my resignation from the Board. effective the end of 2014, so that there is a smooth transition for my successor. My time on the Board has been mostly enjoyable and always rewarding. It is truly a pleasure to be present at Prizegiving to see how well-rounded the students are as they prepare for the next phase of their growth. They exude confidence and will lead very fruitful lives. They always acknowledge that the teaching staff had a huge part to play in their growth during their time at Mangere

In closing, I thank the board members for their hard work and dedication in the past and wish them well for the future. I have enjoyed interacting with all staff and will miss connecting with Mangere College. Please accept my best wishes for future.

Ivan Desmond Armstrong, Foundation Principal 1971 – 1988

The college community was deeply saddened at the news of the passing of Ivan Armstrong in October of this year. Ivan is remembered as a dear colleague, friend and inspirational leader. Fond memories are treasured of his leadership at a very special time in the history of the college. Ivan's legacy remains in the hearts and minds of former and present staff and students.

Ivan Armstrong led Mangere College for its first 18 vears.

He passed away in October of this year and the College has been reflecting on the man, his vision and his legacy to education and the Mangere

Ivan Armstrong was a man of many gifts and abilities; academic, sporting and personal. He was highly regarded in Hockey and Tennis circles, even refereeing at Wimbledon. He wanted to select and strengthen natural talent and offer opportunities to those he came in contact with.

The many tributes at his funeral spoke of a loved and significant leader in numerous lives. He is remembered for his humour, his one-to-one support, his mana.

In his opening address as Principal, Ivan Armstrong was ahead of his time in his understanding of the importance of affirming multi-cultural diversity and

acknowledging that Auckland was and is the largest Polynesian city in the world. The College was established in 1971, opening with 204 students and 19 Staff.

His vision was for a school full of life and enthusiasm. which respected and celebrated Tangata Whenua and Tagata o te Moana and was a source of pride for the district in which it is located. Forty-four years on, the school still seeks to honour this vision. He was passionately involved in the school and worked hard with his management team to set high expectations of all involved in the school.

His last report said, 'I know [what] will remain predominant is the warmth, the concern and friendliness of the Mangere College Community, the staff, our students, our parents and the governing body. It has always had the welfare of its students at

His legacy is far reaching; eighteen years of involvement with young people and community carry some of his vision into the wider world.

required subjects to pursue my chosen career to being a leader and mastering the art of improvisation. But most importantly, I discovered my full potential as a person. I learnt here at Mangere


College to go beyond the limits, to challenge the statistics that society has placed upon us and to never settle for anything less than what we deserve.





Maths Department

This year was another successful year for the department as we have accomplished new challenges and initiatives and have successfully achieved most of our departmental and individual goals. The Teach First trainee teacher Nicole Siew has successfully completed her training to become a qualified teacher for secondary schools. She has been offered a mathematics teacher position at Birkenhead College starting in 2015.

Data spreadsheets have been developed for the department to track and monitor students' achievement data. The system has enabled us to identify students who are at risk of not gaining Numeracy or the 16 Credits targets. At this stage around 71% of all year 11 students have gained Numeracy compared to 50% overall in 2013.

Over 90 percent of the junior students have improved their numeracy levels as shown by the end of year AsTTle results. Teachers have had on-going support and professional development on using technology, teaching enquiry and pedagogies and literacy strategies in teaching in all levels.

This year our top year 9 and year 10 mathematics students were invited to enter the Australian Mathematics Competition. Twenty-eight year 9 and fifteen year 10 students competed and were awarded certificates. The top three achievers in year 9 were Manaa Amosa, Nikita Tata and Cassidy Tahana and in year 10 students were Nathan Ashin, Moeataa Tararo and Campbell Talaepa. Junior Mathex Competitions were successfully administered and run to promote the Maths week in term 3.

I want to acknowledge the commitment, the dedication and the hard work of all teachers in the department for making the year 2014 an enjoyable and successful year.




to reach my goals but it takes patience, hard work and dedication to become successful in the end.


were short-lived as we suffered a Power, pace and plenty of laughs! tough loss to eventual competition winners Dilworth College.



Each player in the team had the right attitude towards everything.





At the beginning of the year some of our students were inspired to join the 'It's not OK' campaign during a school camp where Family Works Family Violence Prevention Advocate and 'It's not OK' ambassador, Jude Simpson, gave a presentation to the students about the impact of family violence in our communities.



This was the beginning of a journey which culminated in the launch of our campaign to say No to family violence. Joining the campaign was supported by the whole of the Mangere College community: Board of Trustees, staff and students. This included a number of student-led initiatives to ensure fellow students were supported within the school to help prevent family violence they may be experiencing at home.

Initiatives included student volunteers who have become champions that other students can approach for confidential advice on how and where to seek support for family violence matters. Elements of the 'It's not OK' campaign have also been included in the school curriculum and a student-designed billboard which depicts the school's stance against family violence.

At the beginning of term 3 the campaign was officially launched. The day started with a Powhiri to welcome official guests and visitors. This was followed by the unveiling of the large billboard which

is now placed in the front of the school.

During the day the students rotated through three stations:

Listening to the stories of people who had been victims and perpetrators of family violence – and how they have coped and rebuilt their lives.

Expo – where agencies such as Youth Line, and Crime stoppers gave out information about accessing help in relation to family violence.

Hot Spot – where there were music performances relating to stopping family violence as well as interactive activities where students learnt about family violence statistics.





The students chose orange as the campaign colour. Students and staff wore orange ribbons to promote the school stance in opposing family violence. The school intends to continue to support the campaign.


